SITE OF ASHLAND HOTEL IS CHOSEN, CAPITAL \$300,000

ASHLAND, Dec. 15.—The hotel situation, as horseshoed in these columns several days ago, is materializing insofar as at least a site is concerned, the location being fixed on Chautauqua grounds, the Southern Oregon assembly voting a sort of franchise in behalf of the hotel movement, which will be termed a community prospect duly incorporated. The capital stock will be \$300,000, represented by 3000 shares of a par value of \$100 each. Arrangements for comprehensive plan details are already under way. Contrary to the impressions of some, the big auditorium will not be dismantled, but it will be retained as a sort of annex to the hotel proper, the big public house also to be of colossal proportions. It is further contemplated to devise methods for heating the auditorium when its use is found necessary. Among incorporators, of course, Jesse Winburn leads in a financial way, a supplementary list including G. S. Butler, J. P. Dodge, Dr. Swendenburg, Bert Greer, Homer Billings, T. H. Simpson, Dr. Burdick, Rev. W. J. Oldfield, Sylvester Patterson, and others. A special advisory committee of the Chautauqua association will have power to act in behalf of that body.

Thursday morning of this week the temperature registered 25, deemed by many the lowest record thus far this season, but official figures are to the contrary, one morning in the bleak November, we remember that it registered 19 in its shirt sleeves.

The Chautauqua association has elected Rev. W. J. Oldfield, president; V. O. N. Smith, vice-president; Homer Billings, secretary, and G. G. Eubanks, treasurer. G. S. Butler, C. H. Vaupel, O. Winter, Mrs. Patterson and Mrs. Ella Mills were chosen as trustees.

The Christian church will hold a bazaar and food sale on Saturday of this week.

Among San Francisco papers, the Call is making inroads into this territory, Lester Beck being circulation distributor for Ashland and vicinity.

Don Spencer is the new commander of the local post, American Legion, Captain J. I. Adams of First Company, being vice-commander; Dr. J. W. Crandall, finance officer. After the election the legion indulged in one of its traditional reunions supplemented by a general feed.

Another great outpouring of the spirit, occurred this week, when the chief of police dumped the contents of bottles and jugs of moonshine into the gutter. The liquid measure amounted up to about the equivalent of over thirty quarts, various brands, seized on various occasions for some time past and condemned under due process of law.

Grand Army veterans have elected Brastus Hall, commander; Aden Spencer, senior and G. O. Van Natta, junior vice-commanders. Captain Thomas is chaplain. Installation will occur either with the first of the year or soon thereafter when appointive officers will be named, at a social gathering when the host and relief corps meet in social session.

Frank Murphy and Max Jordan were Ashland representatives of the Southern Oregon Electrical Dealers' association, which met in Grants Pass early in the week.

Director Loveland of the local band has announced that the customary practice meetings of the organization Monday evening, of each week, have been discontinued until the beginning of the New Year when a definite schedule will be adopted on a permanent basis.

A state bureau of inspection has been represented here of late, an expert interviewing boilers and other equipment, incident to a tour of southern Oregon. Insofar as heating plants are concerned, especially for overpressure and boiler in an absolute superheated tank, the joke, "What we really need is still another state bureau, department, or commission which will enforce, under the severest penalties, an indication on the steam gauge of a pressure ranging from three pounds at least—five pounds being a maximum beyond the realm of the wildest ratio of expectancy, it remains for the governor-elect, in line with his platitudes exerted in behalf of reducing taxation, to recommend to a hostile legislature the wisdom, in the face of a hard winter, of enacting a statute which will expedite the process of certification to the extent of steam boilers performing a bit of fix, due to intense and audacious firing.

A census of vital statistics as applying to dairy cows, sows a number within city limits larger than ever supposed. Over 80 were tested by the federal veterinarian in one forenoon, with "several precincts yet to hear from."

Local income tax payers are reminded that December 15 is the last day for paying the fourth and final installment of the 1921 income tax. If not already paid, persons are liable for both penalty and interest.

A "Notice for Inclusion" is now being published, applying to preliminary in the event the Bellevue district and a certain area within Ashland city limits joins in the movement to secure irrigation privileges under the Talent project. The papers bear signatures of a majority of the owners of acreage in the territory involved and January 2, 1923 has been fixed as a date for hearing the petition at the office of the irrigation district at Talent, at which time objectors are entitled to be present and show cause, if any they have, why

the petition for inclusion should not be granted.

According to letters received here lately from the Canadian maritime provinces, the admonition on official postal cancellation stamps, is not "Christmas seals stamp out tuberculosis," but a reminder that "Drivers turn to the right in New Brunswick," implying a change from traditional English custom in regard to navigating the highways.

Miss Frances McWilliams, teacher in the Oakland schools, California, will come home this week for a vacation visit over the Christmas holidays.

The condition of Stephen Hawks, seriously injured in a fall some time ago, remains precarious, without hopes of recovery. Mr. Hawks was a confirmed invalid even before this accident happened which aggravated the severity of his affliction.

FORMATION OF A THIRD PARTY IS DEFEATED BY VOTE

CLEVELAND, Dec. 15.—(By the Associated Press)—Delegates to the second conference for progressive political action have left for their homes today to perfect state organizations for the nomination and election of candidates, either through "primaries of old parties" or by "independent political action," as set forth in the program of organization adopted at the two-day convention here.

Formation of a third party was defeated at the closing session last night after a prolonged debate in which many speakers characterized the republican and democratic parties as "owned and financed by Wall Street."

A feature of the report of the committee as adopted, was a declaration that the conference as a "leading factor in securing the election of progressive United States senators and members of the house, requests its members to act as a people's bloc and work for the peoples' progressive program, and that the chairman and secretary of this conference call such progressive members together as soon as the new congress convenes to organize them for effective action."

Discussion of the third party question came after a day devoted to the discussion and adoption of a program for future political action and a platform in which was demanded repeal of the Esch-Cummins law, public control of water power, direct election of president and vice-president, that congress enact practice of courts in declaring legislation unconstitutional, enactment of the Norris-Sinclair bill, payments of a soldier bonus by taxes on excess income, and legislation providing minimum standards of employment for women.
