

## SALVATION ARMY ACTIVE IN XMAS WORK IN COUNTY

The Salvation Army as its custom throughout the world, is remembering the poor and needy as far as the means at hand will allow, and in conjunction with other county organizations, is trying to follow the advice and admonition of Him who said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

A Christmas tree and program will be held at the Salvation Army hall Monday night, Dec. 25th, where suitable remembrances will be given out to all Salvation Army Sunday school children, and the poor children.

A "gift box" will be placed in the Salvation Army hall and those desiring to give gifts of food, and provisions may do so and they will be distributed.

The Salvation Army "Christmas Kettles" with their sign "Keep the Pot Boiling," (a familiar sight in cities at the Yuletide season), are on the streets attended by Salvationists where the public may give their contributions for the Christmas dinners, winter relief and general work.

Christmas appeals have been distributed and in there is space provided for the names of needy which can be mailed to the Salvation Army and they will receive attention.

Help the Salvation Army continue the good work. The workers understand human nature and know how to help and relieve.

**Work for Year**  
Below are approximate figures of work done by the Salvation Army within the past 12 months. The Salvation Army has been busy endeavoring to do a work among the unchurched, the unfortunate, the down and (almost) out.

As to the evangelistic side of the work the below mentioned figures may give some idea of what has been accomplished.

Sixty-five men have knelt at the altar asking God's forgiveness for a sinful past.

Five hundred twenty-two meetings conducted outdoor and indoor also, with an attendance of 15,200.

One hundred junior meetings conducted with a total attendance of 2,052 young people including the Bible class.

About 600 garments given away.  
About 105 pairs of shoes.

About 78 meals given away.  
Total valuation of relief work done, about \$250.

Two-thirds of the girls are working for Girl Reserve rings, which can only be won and not bought.

The business girls enjoyed a "Hanging of the Green" party at the Y. W. C. A. Thursday evening. Admission was by a lot of greens for decorating, and a part of the entertainment was the decorating of the house with the greens thus furnished. Santa Claus appeared late in the evening and presented a gift to each one present. Mrs. Isabelle Van Fleet favored the girls with several vocal selections, and after refreshments were served all joined in singing Christmas carols.

The assurance policy of the association is being promoted by the Y. W. C. A. during this time. This year certain pieces of work being carried on during 1923. One of these special pieces of work is that of the girls' fund for girls arriving from foreign countries, also the work which is being promoted among these girls before they leave for our shores. This is an important piece of work. It is expected to make good American citizens of these new arrivals.

Though it is the holiday season, there are girls who are looking for work; there are girls who are away from home and loneliness and the Y. W. C. A. is trying to meet these girls and supply their needs, whether it be work, comfortable living quarters, friends, good times, or an opportunity for expression. You, too, can help in this work, for there is no greater cry over the world today than the cry for leadership, especially among the girls and women. There are girls' clubs without advisers, and this is one of the most delightful things you can find to do in association work. **ARREST ARMY MAN  
ON BIGAMY CHARGE**

CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—Captain Charles Pike of the army medical corps, stationed at a Chicago army hospital, was arrested last night on a charge of bigamy and was reported to have been taken to Crown Point, Ind., for a preliminary hearing today.

Mrs. Pike who witnessed her husband's arrest by three men, at first expressed fear that he had been kidnapped. Later she learned that a warrant and registration papers had been issued for Captain Pike on a complaint of bigamy brought by a woman who asserted she had contracted a common law marriage with him at Philadelphia.

DUBLIN, Dec. 16.—(By Associated Press.) President Cosgrave of the Irish Free state replying to the peace resolutions of the Cork harbor commission in which the Dail was urged to appoint a committee to meet the senate peace commission says:

"If peace is to be established at the cost of allowing people to commandeer goods, arrest citizens and break solemn agreements made with another nation, the sooner I am informed that I do not represent public opinion, the better. I am not prepared to recommend that the Dail go farther than it already has gone."

**HERRIN MASSACRE  
TRIAL IS DRAGGING**

MARION, Ill., Dec. 16.—Attorneys for both state and defense in the trial of miners charged with murder in connection with the Herrin mine slaying of last July today predicted the end of the trial by the middle of January.

During the first three days of the trial, testimony has been given by more than a score of state's witnesses. During the Saturday and Sunday recess taken last night, the attorneys said they would go over their list of witnesses in the hope of reducing them. So far the state's witnesses have pointed to four of the five defendants as having been seen with guns in their hands during the riots, but all have said that they were unable to identify any of those as participants in the shooting.

## PORTLAND PASTOR TO TAKE CHARGE GOLD H. CHURCH

GOLD HILL, Ore., Dec. 15.—(Special Correspondence.) Dr. M. M. Reid, recently of Portland, has taken over the pastorate of the M. E. church at Gold Hill and will divide his time between these two charges. The Gold Hill church has been without a local pastor the past two years, which resulted in a disorganization of the several weekly services in the church. The doctor, who is a practicing physician and chiropractor has been out of the ministry the past three years, due to throat trouble which he has recently fully controlled. He spent ten years in the Oregon M. E. conference and several years in California and Washington charges. His wife is his able assistant in his church work. A feature of his pastoral work at Gold Hill is a regular mid-week lecture to his congregation on health, dealing with the physical, mental and spiritual plan of man.

That the local cement employees have a due reverence for their fellow workers was evidenced by the novel serenade given one of their newlywed last Wednesday night. Parker, pioneers of Rogue River valley, and Vera Reed, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Reed, the well known merchant of Medford. The wedding ceremony was performed last Tuesday evening at the home of the bride's parents in Medford by Rev. Leach of the Medford Baptist church. About thirty relatives and friends were wedding guests and many valuable presents were received in honor of the event. Among the guests from Gold Hill were Mr. and Mrs. M. Parker, Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Kellogg, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Haley and Loyal R. Parker.

Harvey Tresham, the well known farm operator of Sains Valley, has taken a long-term lease on the large acred Chavner farm on the Pacific highway just across the river from Gold Hill. The lessee has extensive equipment for intensive farming and will push plowing and seeding to bring the entire tract into cultivation the coming season. The major part of the tract is the richest farm land in the valley and is sub-irrigated by natural drainage. The most of the farm will be planted to alfalfa, which will be turned into dairy product and stock on the farm.

**ENGLAND STRONGLY  
OPPOSES TURKEY**

LAUSANNE, Dec. 16.—England took an energetic stand at Lausanne yesterday against the Turkish plan of deporting the patriarch of the Greek orthodox church at Constantinople. The British delegate told the sub-committee that the expulsion of the patriarch from the traditional seat which he has occupied since the conquest of Constantinople would strike a mortal blow against the religious sentiments of all orthodox peoples, and shock the religious sentiments of countries like England.

"England has great sympathy for orthodoxy, which is based on the religious traditions of Christianity," he said, "and other countries feel the same; probably America also."
