EASTERN ELEVENS LEAVE FOR TESTS WITH WEST TEAMS

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Seeking inter-sectional laurels, three eastern football elevens will leave this week for the Pacific coast, where during the holidays they will meet far western rivals.

West Virginia will play Gonzaga university of Spokane, Wash., at San Diego, Calif., Christmas day; University of Pittsburgh meets Stanford university in the new Stanford stadium at Palo Alto, Calif., on December 30, and on New Year's day Penn State opposes the University of Southern California at Pasadena, during the Tournament of Roses.

Undated this year, West Virginia was ranked as one of the strongest teams in the east, while Pittsburgh recovered from a disappointing start to finish the season with sensational victories over W. and J., Pennsylvania, and Penn State. Penn State which experienced one of its poorest seasons in some time is the only one of the three eastern colleges that has visited the Pacific coast before.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 18.—The trade of Nick Dumovich, star pitcher of the Los Angeles club of the Pacific Coast baseball league, to the Chicago National club for five players and \$15,000 in cash is the first step in the rebuilding of the Los Angeles club, according to Charles Lockhard, business manager.

The five players to come here in the trade are: Walter Golvin, first baseman; George Maisel, outfielder; Marty Krug, second baseman; Percy Jones, left handed pitcher, and another outfielder. These men are said to be worth \$65,000.

The decision, announced by Chairman Muldoon, of the New York board, will prevent Smith from meeting Joe Lynch, world's bantam-weight champion, in Madison Square Garden, Friday night.
