The Irish delegation who have been the guests of Father Powers left Tuesday morning for San Francisco after a visit of four days here. They were charmed with what they saw of Medford and vicinity. Father O'Flanagan is a specialist in botany and was interested in the trees, flowers and

plants of this place. He has the hope to try the experiment in Ireland of these and firmly believes it will succeed. While here he assisted in the services of the Catholic church on Sunday and Christmas. He preached eloquent and instructive sermons on Sunday at the 10:30 mass and at the Christmas midnight mass.
