

FLORENCE POOL RESIGNS OFFICE ON JANUARY 1ST

The news will be received with much regret in this city and throughout the county that Miss Florence Pool, after three years service as county home demonstration agent has resigned on account of her health, to cease the duties of the office on January 1st.

Her successor, Miss Grayce Teich, an experienced home demonstration agent, is already here and will put in the week with Miss Pool in preparing to assume charge. While loth to part with so old a friend as Miss Pool it is certain that the Jackson county public will receive with open arms Miss Teich, who comes very highly recommended and is far from being a novice in home demonstration work.

Miss Teich's experience in home demonstration work was obtained in Arizona. She took graduate courses at Iowa State college at Ames, Iowa, Columbia college, New York, and has just recently taken a special course in such work at the O. A. C.

Miss Pool has not yet definitely announced her plans for the future, but it is understood that she will engage in a business venture temporarily at least. She has been one of the pillars of strength in the large and successful farm bureau work during her long service in this county, and has made uncountable friends by this work and other labors in the interest of the public.

Through her hard and earnest work during this period her health has been robust, but she gave to her position her best endeavors, until the situation had reached the stage that a change of duties from the daily routine of three years past seemed imperative for her to regain full strength and vigor.

Miss Pool stated today that while she will cease to have active charge of the home demonstration office on January 1st, her interest in that office and its work would still be retained and she will always be willing to give her successor her best efforts and advice. She urges that Miss Teich be accorded the same kindly interest and hearty cooperation that she has always met with. Miss Pool has had six years without cessation in home demonstration work, most of it pioneering in that line, in North Dakota, Montana and in Jackson county.

TOO MUCH BOASTING RESULTS IN ARREST

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—Charles Dauchowski, arrested in San Diego, Cal., on a larceny charge December 1, was identified last night as one of two men sought in connection with the slaying of Lieutenant Terrance Lyons, because of his desire to impress another criminal with his accomplishments, according to the police here.

It was said that he was overheard to remark to another prisoner that he killed two policemen in Chicago. The identification followed.

A detective left for San Diego today to claim the man, ending a search which has extended through twenty cities.

TRAIN HITS MACHINE PIONEER IS KILLED

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 27.—R. M. Breeze, aged 70, pioneer of this valley was instantly killed and his son W. H. Breeze lies seriously injured in a local hospital as a result of a collision between their automobile and train No. 1361, a freight at the North street crossing in the outskirts of this city shortly after ten o'clock this morning. According to Engineer Joe Metcalf, who is a veteran on the division his train was going about fifteen miles an hour and the driver of the automobile saw as he started to speed across the tracks and stalled his machine.

ARMOUR CHARTER CERTIFICATE IS FILED IN DOVER

DOVER, Del., Dec. 27.—The certificate for a charter for Armour, and company in Delaware was filed at the office of the secretary of state here today. The company is capitalized at \$160,000,000 and is authorized to deal in cattle and livestock of all kinds. The incorporators named in the certificate are A. M. Hooven, M. A. Bruce and H. M. Anderson, all of Wilmington, Delaware, identified with the Corporation Trust company of America which drew up the incorporation papers.

The incorporation papers make no mention of any contemplated merger, simply following the legal lines of such applications.

The new corporation is authorized to conduct a general mercantile and manufacturing business particularly the buying, selling and dealing in cattle, hogs, sheep and other livestock, grain, poultry, butter, eggs, etc., to operate, equip and maintain manufacturing and other plants, packing houses, factories and branch establishments and other property pertaining to the conduct of such business.

The capital stock is divided into one million shares of preferred stock with a par value of \$100 a share, and six hundred thousand shares of common with a par value of \$100 a share.

The charter is a perpetual one. The state received a tax of \$8.100.

News Summary of Last Night

DUBLIN.—A resolution in favor of the re-convening of the Ard Thiels, or general Sinn Fein convention as a move for peace was reported to have been passed at a meeting of Sinn Fein club.

ROME.—Scientists, artists and men of letters were among the 24 persons whom Premier Mussolini has decided to appoint as senators.

BERLIN.—Chancellor Cuno resumed discussion with his ministers of amplified reparations proposals which it was said would include an offer for definitely fixing the reparations to Italy based on a present survey of Germany's economic capacity.

NEW YORK.—The organization known as the workers party of America sent a message to the communist international at Moscow saying its convention had devoted itself to building a revolutionary movement in America.

BALTIMORE.—The Baltimore and Ohio railroad sent bonus checks aggregating \$500,000 to employees who remained loyal during the late railroad shop strike.

MEXICO CITY.—The chamber of deputies approved the bill presented by President Obregon proposing amnesty for rebel prisoners.

WASHINGTON.—Elmer Knutsen of St. Cloud, Minn., was selected as an agricultural representative of the car service division of the American Railway association under a plan to keep more closely in touch with agricultural transportation needs.

WASHINGTON.—Conrad E. Spens prepared his resignation as fuel distributor.

DUBLIN.—Eamon DeValera in a declaration said the republicans dedicated themselves anew to the achievement of the independence of our country.

MEMPHIS.—Miss Chari Williams of Memphis announced she would resign as vice chairman of the democratic national committee.

PENN STATE STAR INJURED' MAY BE OUT OF N Y GAME

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 27.—Penn State players and officials showed much concern here today over the injuries of J. Bedenk, star Nittany Lion guard who came disabled out of a scrimmage in yesterday's practice. Opinion was expressed from superficial examination that the outstanding lineman of the Penn State team would not be able to be in Monday's game against the University of Southern California and surgeons were prepared to make a complete examination today.

Officials Selected
PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 27.—Officials who will handle the Tournament of Roses annual east vs. west football game here have been approved by the coaches of both teams. It was stated today. They are George Varnell, formerly a football player at Chicago university; Thom Thorpe of New York, Jack Wells of Los Angeles, formerly an Occidental college player, and C. J. McCarthy, whose college affiliations were not stated in the official announcement.

The men have not been assigned to their respective positions, but it is thought that Thorpe will referee and Varnell umpire, or vice versa.

Both the Penn State and U. S. C. teams are here and practice will be held by each every day at the Rose bowl.

While football followers say the Trojans will be the favorites January 1, Coach Elmer C. Henderson of U. S. C., is working his squad harder than ever.

After being reminded that western teams have won three and tied one out of five east-west games played here, Coach Henderson said:

"But did those eastern teams have to play Penn State. I'll guarantee they didn't. You can believe that Penn State will be equally as hard an opponent for U. S. C. as Washington and Jefferson was for California or Harvard for Oregon and some of the others down the line."

"We are not fooled by the report circulated that Coach Hugo Bezdek will use mostly second string men when the Lions meet U. S. S.," said Clifton Herd, advisory coach at U. S. C. "Captain Bentz and all the other stars will be in the game doing their best."

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 27.—Jimmy Duffy of Aberdeen and Chick Rocco of Portland will compete in the headline event at the smoker and boxing tournament to be staged in the state armory here tonight under the auspices of company F, Oregon National Guard.

NEBRASKA BANK CLOSES ITS DOORS

LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 27.—Announcement of failure of the Berwyn State bank in Custer county was made today by J. E. Hart, Nebraska state secretary of trade and commerce. Exhausted resources and bad accounts were given as the reason. Custer county is reported to have had \$44,000 on deposit in the bank which had a capital of \$15,000, surplus of \$5,000, deposits of \$224,000, loans outstanding \$262,000, and borrowings \$26,000, of which the war finance corporation was creditor to the extent of half.

SPECIAL WEATHER REPORT BY RADIO FOR CARRIBEAN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec.—Special weather bulletin service for the benefit of shipping in the Caribbean Sea has been arranged for by the United States Weather Bureau through the radio service of a commercial steamship company. The bulletins will be flashed twice daily from the company's station on Swan Island, in the western Caribbean.

The morning bulletins will be sent out only during the hurricane season which lasts from June through November, and will be in two parts. The first part will contain weather observations from ten selected stations throughout the West Indies and near-by coasts. The second part will contain daily forecasts of wind and weather for the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean west of longitude 73 degrees, and advices and warnings regarding the location and movement of hurricanes in warm weather and "northerns" in winter.

The night bulletins will be broadcast daily throughout the year and will contain forecasts, advices and warnings similar to those included in the second part of the morning bulletins.
