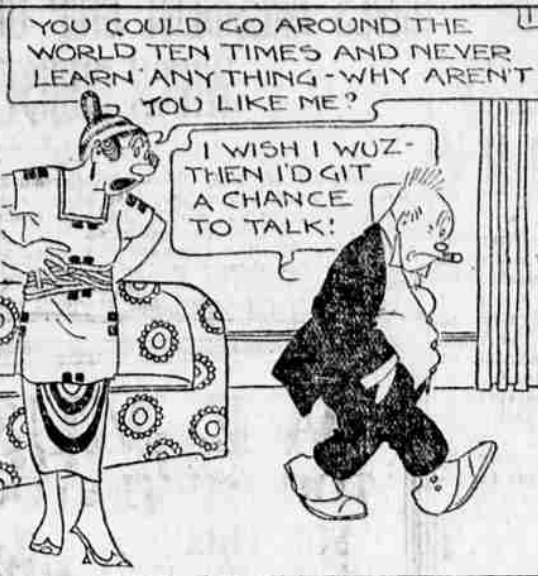

MISSION SAILS FOR AMERICA TO SETTLE DEBTS

LONDON, Dec. 28.—(By Associated Press.) The British financial mission to the United States headed by Stanley Baldwin, chancellor of the exchequer, sailed for New York yesterday morning on the line Majestic. Besides the chancellor the party included Mrs. Baldwin and daughter; Montague C. Norman, governor of the Bank of England; Rowe Dutton, financial adviser, and P. J. Greig of the treasury.

In a statement to the Evening Standard today Mr. Baldwin pointed out that under the present arrangements, Great Britain's payments to the United States would amount to between 60,000,000 and 70,000,000 pounds annually. "We hope to fund this debt," he said, "and get the burden of interest eased. If it is successful I hope America will be kind to a much more important mission which Mr. Bonar Law is shortly to undertake."

The Evening Standard says this later refers to a reparations settlement. The chancellor added that it is of supreme importance to Europe that America should have a say as regards Europe's financial problem.

STORM RESULTS IN 2 SEA FATALITIES

PLYMOUTH, England, Dec. 28.—(By Associated Press.) Two fatalities at sea, directly attributable to the terrific storms encountered on the Atlantic during the past week were reported by vessels reaching this port today.

William Holmes, traveling with his wife and five children on the German steamer Halmon, which arrived from Baltimore, was killed during the voyage when he was thrown to the deck, sustaining a fractured skull. He was buried at sea.

The second mate of the steamer Neotsfield, bound from Newfoundland to Bremerhaven, was washed overboard and several members of the crew seriously injured while the vessel was laboring in the terrific sea. The Neotsfield put into this port before proceeding to Bremerhaven.

TACOMA ATTORNEY TO BE DISBARRED

TACOMA, Dec. 28.—Walter M. Harvey, for nearly thirty years a prominent attorney here and for the past year a lawyer in Seattle, has been found guilty on four counts by the state board of law examiners, and his disbarment was recommended to the state supreme court. The findings in the case were made known by Dix H. Rowland, who went to Olympia this morning to file the papers with the supreme court.

Attorney Harvey was found guilty on three separate counts involving fraudulent and unprofessional conduct.

Mr. Harvey was prominent in social affairs and politics here.

To Speed Up Courts.
SEATTLE, Dec. 28.—The King County Bar association is going to ask the Washington legislature to reduce the law's delays. Among the suggestions of the association is a new law to speed up justice requiring courts to settle one case before hearing another.
