

JUDGE CALKINS IS ELECTED DIRECTOR JACKSON CO. BANK

The Jackson County bank today announced the election of F. M. Calkins to membership on its board of directors. Judge Calkins, who has been on the circuit bench of Jackson and Josephine counties for the past 13 years, is planning on a vacation in California after the first of the year. On his return to Medford the judge will engage in the practice of law, and will have his office with Attorney Herbert Hanna. While the judge himself has never been identified with any bank before, his brother is an old-time banker, and is now president of the United States National bank in Eugene, Oregon.

RECORD HOLIDAY POSTAL BUSINESS

While the statistics have not yet been fully compiled it is known that the Christmas business receipts of this year at the Medford postoffice were 20 per cent more than the receipts taken in on any previous year. This is much due to the fact that there are more people living in the city, and to the liberal buying and sending.

The Christmas rush this year was handled better than ever before by the local postoffice, due to the fact that unusually good train service was enjoyed. The Yuletide packages arriving on nearly every parcel carrying train scattered over a period of days before Christmas. Instead of mostly coming in a rush at the last minute.

On last Sunday the postoffice delivered over 1200 Christmas parcels in the residence district. Every package received Sunday was delivered. On Monday, Christmas day, the postoffice made another clean up delivery of all packages, which had been received on the later trains, and by Monday night the last package had been delivered.

NON-EMPLOYMENT INSURANCE URGED BY LABOR LEADER

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—Avoidance of over-expansion in times of activity and establishment of markets for products in times of depression were among the remedies for periodic business depression which Wesley C. Mitchell, director of the national bureau of economic research, forecast today would be included in the report of President Harding's conference on unemployment, in his speech before the American Association for Labor Legislation at a session at "which the business cycle and unemployment" was the topic.

"The investigation disclosed there were about 4,000,000 idle men in the depression of 1921," Mr. Mitchell said in speaking of the conference. "Small employers gave much steadier employment than did the larger ones. The leanest years in our recent business history have run something like 15 to 25 per cent behind the fattest years and 8 to 12 per cent behind moderately good ones."

Unemployment insurance was advocated by Bryce M. Stewart, former director of the public employment service of Canada.

"Neither employment exchanges or workmen can function to the best advantage unless accompanied by employment insurance," said Mr. Stewart. "Without unemployment insurance an employment exchange cannot tell the numbers of unemployed, where they are located or occupations."

Leo Wollman, director of research of the Americanated Clothing Workers of America, declared the time was ripe for unemployment insurance.

Kohn a leader of the Ku Klux Klan was sent to Governor Ritchie by Governor Parker. It read: "Reported leader of Ku Klux Klan, Dr. B. M. McKoin, now under arrest in Baltimore. Have just received a telegram he has instituted habeas corpus proceedings before the supreme bench of Baltimore city. In view of urgency of this case and investigation now going on, would greatly appreciate asking attorney general to require a few days' delay in order to bring this man before the bar of justice."

Affidavit charging him with murder will be forwarded as quickly as possible. This request made by the attorney general of Louisiana, who states that this case is of vital importance and the retention of this man essential. Please answer fully at my expense of your decision."

Governor Ritchie immediately communicated with State's Attorney Leach and imparted the contents of the telegram to him with a request that he telegraph Governor Parker of the outcome of the habeas corpus proceedings.

Sp Penn State Star GUARD O. K. AGAIN FOR N. YEAR GAME

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 28.—Coach Hugo Bezdek of Penn State is concentrating on defensive football in practice at the Rose Bowl here in preparation for the game against the University of Southern California as the sports feature of the annual Tournament of Roses New Year's day.

In workouts Bezdek has his second string men play on the offensive throughout and they are said to make no gain against the heavy Nittany Lions.

Bezdek says he is not satisfied even with their showing against the second team and that he will shift his lineup a dozen times if necessary before New Year's day to decide which eleven men are best fitted to start.

F. J. Dendick, Nittany Lion guard, who was injured in practice, is able to train with the others but Bezdek says he will not allow him to get into the "rough stuff."

The Trojans also are holding daily workouts in the Rose Bowl under Coach Elmer C. Henderson and Clifton B. Herd, advisory coach and scout. They have a mixed workout which includes a blackboard talk, dummy practice, falling on the ball, blocking and other fundamentals, followed by a scrimmage and signal drill. The team is reported in good condition.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 28.—Manager Wade ("Red") Kilmer, has signed twelve semi-professional players and he is now trying to come to terms with the thirteenth, as part of the rebuilding program planned for the Los Angeles club of the Pacific Coast baseball league for 1923, it was announced.

The club management has said that the Angels next season will be a team of young players and Kilmer says he will hunt high and low for youngsters.

Danny Kramer, the Los Angeles southpaw and Joe Gorman of Portland, featherweights, will mix in the ten round go.

George Burns and Chick Rocco, light weights, will fight the six round semi-windup. Both are home boys. Jack Griffin and Ritchie Davis, welterweights who fought a draw recently, Tim Callahan and Gene Murphy whose right name is Johnny Fogate, Mickey Farley and Earl Zimmerman and Benny Dotson, will fight four round bouts.

Cubs Training at Catalina
CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—The Chicago Cubs baseball team has arranged 30 games for the training trip this spring, prior to the opening of the National league season. It was announced this afternoon. The pitchers and catchers will leave Chicago February 22 and arrive at Catalina Island, Cal., the permanent training camp of the club, February 25. The infielders and outfielders will leave Chicago March 1 and arrive at the training camp March 4. After training five days on the island, the club will line up with Vernon or Los Angeles in a practice game March 10th.

NEW SPORT CODE FOR FOOTBALL IS DISCUSSED, N. Y.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Proposals designed to improve the "health" of intercollegiate and interscholastic football are contained in a code of fair play, good sportsmanship and coaching ethics adopted by the American football coaches' association at its annual meeting yesterday. The code was framed by a committee of which A. A. Stagg of the University of Chicago is chairman.

Under "fairplay" scrupulous observance was urged of such fundamentals as using only students strictly eligible under amateur and institutional rules, selection of competent officials and starting hours certain to permit completion in ample daylight.

Enumeration of ways in which "good sportsmanship" can be expressed included: By ceasing cheering while signals are being called; applauding outstanding plays, demonstrations of personal pluck and acts of fine sportsmanship on the part of the opponents; confining scouting to legitimate study of regularly played games; endeavoring to settle questions of eligibility confidentially, rather than by public discussion.

As ethical practices coaches were urged in the code to "refuse to teach side line coaching, clipping, intentional roughness and other methods of violating the letter or spirit of rules; to encourage respect toward officials and discourage abusive talk between opposing players during a game; to elevate the ideals above the desire to win at any price; to work in harmony with the academic purposes of institutions; and to discourage proselyting, recruiting, betting, professional football, the spirit of commercialism."

At the same time the president was made a knight of the Order of the Holy Sepulchre by the archbishop, who appeared at the White House in the full dress of his office, carrying a long gold wand and other insignia of his rank.
