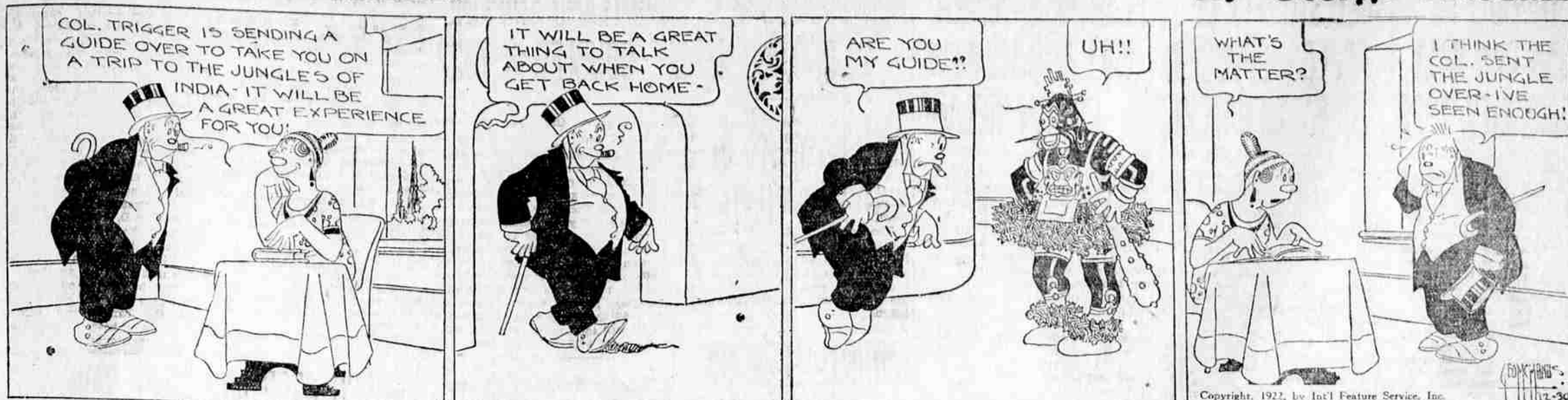

Corn Record 1922
CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—Corn receipts at Chicago in 1922 smashed all records, figures available today showed. Receipts of corn for the year were 193,371,000 bushels compared with 182,982,000 bushels in 1921.

The big crop and unusual export demand for corn were the principal factors in bringing in the largest corn receipts on record, it was said at the office of the secretary of the Board of Trade.

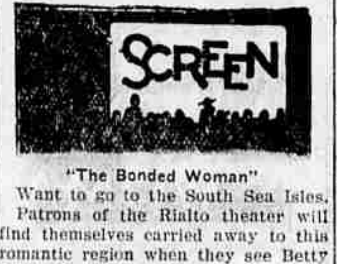
N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Virtually all groups of stocks moved to higher levels in today's brief session of the market, the last of the year. Wide-spread predictions of business prosperity during the coming year and Secretary Hughes' suggestion of an international conference of financiers to settle the reparations problem had a cheerful effect on sentiment, while an advance in Pennsylvania Crude oil prices was reflected in a brisk demand for the oil shares. Some of the other strong spots were Standard Oil of California, Houston Oil, Chicago and Northwestern, Continental Can, Bosch Magneto, Stromberg Carborundum, all up 2 to 4 points.
