

WM. H. CUSHMAN, JACKSON COUNTY PIONEER, PASSES

William H. Cushman died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Joe Rowe at Gold Hill, Oregon Dec. 30, aged 72 years, three months, 15 days. Deceased was born at Albany, Ore., Sept. 15, 1850, and was of pioneer stock settling forty years ago in the wilds of the Trail country where he carved out for himself and family a home in the wilderness and where his eight children were born. He was a wonderful hunter and athlete. Mr. Cushman leaves four sons and four daughters: Wallace, William, Charles Cushman of Trail, Ore.; John Cushman, Colorado; Mrs. John Hall, Sams Valley, Ore.; Mrs. Fred Warner, Trail, Ore.; Mrs. Joe Rowe, Gold Hill, Ore., and Mrs. J. Edmiston, Gold Hill, Ore. Remains are at the Perl Funeral Home and funeral services will be held at the Sams Valley cemetery Tuesday morning at 10 a. m., Rev. D. E. Millard, officiating. Interment in Pankey Park cemetery.

INVITE MEDFORD TO JOIN IN ALL- AMERICAN MEAL

An "All-American Meal" is the latest idea in chamber of commerce circles. In a letter from the Sacramento, California chamber of commerce, Medford is invited to get in on the game.

The method of operation, as outlined in the letter from Manager A. S. Dudley of the Sacramento organization is a simple one:

The principal cities of the United States are asked to send to the Sacramento chamber a list of the outstanding food products grown or manufactured in their sections. These will be gone over by a committee of food experts who will prepare the menu which will consist entirely of American products.

There are two conditions: First, the food products must be one that can be obtained anywhere in the United States any day in the year; secondly, it must be an All-American product. Canned or processed materials may be used, but no imported material of any kind can form even a fraction of a portion of the commodity.

Announcement of the menu will be made through magazines and newspapers, and will be followed by such features as "All-American Meal Day," when people throughout the United States will be urged to serve the products.

This is a fine thing for the entire country and will directly benefit all sections. Here in our own community we have canned peaches, apples, prunes, plums, tomatoes, beans, peas, etc., and dried peaches, pears, apples and prunes, which would meet the requirements and be placed on the menu. If we have overlooked any, we would like to have our citizens give us the names of other food products which would qualify, so we can have a complete list to send to Sacramento.

This is a splendid opportunity to stimulate the consumption of American food products. The benefits will be far-reaching. Undoubtedly this movement will bring to the attention of the public a number of American food products of splendid quality, economical in price and high in nutritive values, of which the householder has not been aware. Likewise it will benefit the American farmer and producer and American industry in general.
