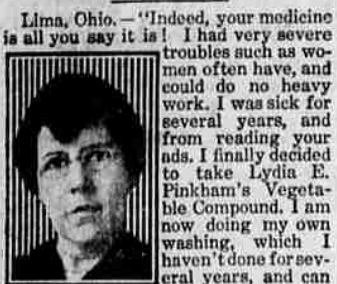

PRESIDENT HARDING IS COMMENDED BY MEDFORD BAPTISTS

At the Sunday evening musical service at the First Baptist church resolutions were passed commending President Harding in his stand on prohibition and urging action toward joining with other nations for making of permanent peace. The resolutions were ordered sent to the president. The resolutions are as follows:

"To President Warren G. Harding: 'The First Baptist church of Medford, Oregon, with more than 450 members and congregation hereby records its hearty appreciation of your recent message, wherein you proclaim your steadfast purpose to employ the powers of the government in the enforcement of the 18th amendment.'

"We also do most respectfully and strongly urge that you use your high office to the end that the government take immediate steps to bring the United States into real relationship with the other nations of the world, either through the League of Nations or some other effective form of association to the end that permanent and lasting peace be secured by the creation of good will and human brotherhood. We are opposed to war as a means of settling difficulties among nations."

JACK EDMUNSON TO OPEN BOXING CLASS

RAINFALL IN 1922 GREATER THAN 1921

The rainfall at the Southern Oregon Experiment Station during December was very heavy, amounting to 5.51 inches. This is an inch above the average for that month. The total rainfall from September 1, 1922, to January 1, 1922, was 9.10 inches. This is 61 per cent more than fell during the same period in 1921. The importance of this is understood by every person in the valley, as it assures good crops next year.

MOSE BARKDULL'S FAITHFUL CANINE 'TURK' PASSES ON

Turk, a shepherd dog, belonging to Mose Barkdull, departed for the happy hunting ground Sunday, age 20 years, a veteran of scores of street fights, and the only canine in the world to journey to a democratic national convention. He accompanied his master to San Francisco in 1920. Turk was a familiar figure in this city, until he moved to the Barkdull orchard, and was widely cursed for his penchant to get into fights with his kind, and never winning. Outside of having all the hair burned off his body, when a gasoline torch blew up in the B. G. Worthington tinshop in 1915, he led an active life, until the rheumatism claimed him. During his days, Turk had his head patted by William J. Bryan and Woodrow Wilson, and a number of other democratic dignitaries of this state. He ate something during the war and nearly died under the Bear Creek bridge, before veterinary assistance arrived.

Turk was born in England in 1903, and was brought to this country by Colonel Ray. In 1907 he was sent to Ray Gold, while the dam was being built. Colonel Ray left for the east, and gave him to John D. Olwell. The latter bequeathed him to Mose Barkdull, and was a member of that household for 16 years, or since 1907. He cost \$250, pre-war price, and was of pure Shepherd blood, coming from the Royal Kennels, at Woolsey Lodge. Turk had been ailing for several years. Sunday morning he entered his master's house, crawled on a bed in violation of previous training, and then went out in the backyard and died.

"A good pal gone," was Mr. Barkdull's comment on the passing of Turk.

OBITUARY

OSBORNE — William Osborne, aged 63 years, passed away at his home, 211 Wash street, in this city early yesterday morning. Mr. Osborne had been in ill health for some time, but his condition was not considered critical until the night of his passing.

He was born at Springfield, Mo., in 1858, and in 1887 was married to Mary Jackson. They came to Southern Oregon 10 years ago, residing in Central Point, and two years ago moved to Medford.

Besides his wife, he leaves one brother, John Osborne at Giltedge, Montana.

Funeral services will be held at Conger's chapel at 2:00 p. m. Thursday, Rev. Coy R. Sims officiating. Interment in L. O. O. F. cemetery.
