GOLD HILL, Jan. 3.—(Special). William E. Rosecrans, a long time employe at the local cement plant and a veteran of the late war has purchased the Sterling C. Minick 20-acre tract just north of Central Point. This is a well improved acreage property and the new owner will place the tract under intensive cultivation the coming season. He will move with his family in a few days from Gold Hill to commence farm operations, but he will continue his employment from his new home until the spring weather fully settles.

The Jewett Six is in Medford!
