

### HEAVY RAIN ADDS TO FLOOD PERIL

SEATTLE, Jan. 11.—Heavy rains last night and this morning again sent King county rivers out of their banks in many places and caused suspension of auto bus transportation to many points in the White River valley between Seattle and Tacoma.

Near Seattle, the Eighth avenue bridge over the Duwamish river was threatened but street department officials said the situation was under control.

Bridges over the Snoqualmie river were endangered by the cutting away of banks, according to reports to County Engineer Thomas R. Beaman.

### BRITISH ARRANGE WAR DEBT DATA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—The British debt fund commission locked itself in its hotel suite this morning to speed the day preparing data for tomorrow's joint session with the American commission in the second conference on a funding arrangement for Great Britain's war debt.

Announcement was made on behalf of Chancellor of the Exchequer Baldwin, head of the commission, that today would be spent "figuring."

### MISSING MANAGER OF BANK FOUND

TACOMA, Jan. 11.—Spencer Conroy, assistant manager of the Bank of California's local branch, was arrested last night in Los Angeles, according to a telegram received today by United States Marshal Ed Henn. Conroy disappeared last August 3 and was reported to be about \$5000 short in his accounts.

Associated Press.—R. L. Dade, mayor of Mer Rouge and a former member of the Morehouse parish branch of the Ku Klux Klan, testified at the open hearing into hooded band depredations in Morehouse today that at one time he had been instructed by J. K. Skipwith, Klan leader to notify three Mer Rouge citizens they would have to "leave town."

Dade named the men ordered to leave town as A. C. Whipple, Town Marshal Campbell of Mer Rouge and a man named Miller.

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 11.—After sharp debate the senate of the Texas legislature today referred to a committee a resolution commending and endorsing the efforts of Governor J. M. Parker in behalf of law enforcement.

The resolution was introduced by Senators Burkett, Rogers and Turner. The debate was on advisability of making any expression on hooded mobs and masked political organizations.

### RADIUM DOWN TO \$70,000 A GRAM

PARIS, Jan. 11.—A plant near Antwerp which extracts radium from ore newly discovered in the Belgian Congo, has so improved its methods that the American producing companies controlling the market have decided to shut down, says a Brussels dispatch to LeMatin.

Soon after the discovery of the rich deposits of Congo ore, the price of radium declined to \$70,000 a gram. It had previously averaged \$107,000.

### DR. SUN'S FORGES SCORE VICTORY

LONDON, Jan. 11.—A Reuter dispatch from Shanghai reports that the Cantonese troops have driven back the constitutionalists advancing from Wuchow. The correspondent asserts that heavy fighting is expected soon.

Sun Yat Sen, deposed president of the south China republic, said in an interview that he expected his army to retake Canton within a fortnight, restoring his power in the south. Sun's troops recently took Wuchow.

### MINNEAPOLIS FIRE TO BE PROBED

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 11.—The county coroner's office today planned to investigate the fire in the Lincoln hotel here last night which resulted in one person being apprehended, caused injury to a dozen others and forced three score guests to flee for their lives.

Among the injured was A. C. Tveit, Seattle, Wash.

maintain the entente cordiale with France.

Notification of the decision to withdraw the American troops from the Rhine was received by Major General Allen in Coblenz, who prepared to carry out the plans for the return of the troops to the United States.

In Washington it was understood the recall of the troops would not be followed by withdrawal of American participation in the reparations commission under the present policy of the administration.

### WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN THE RUHR

(By the Associated Press)—The French army is encircling the heart of the Ruhr valley. Marching into Essen this morning in their new move for the occupation of additional German territory, French troops began patrolling the streets of Essen and sentries took positions at the entrance of the great Krupp works.

French tanks command the Essen city hall square, and pickets of infantry hold the railroad station.

Before noon the occupation of Essen was an accomplished fact. The advance from the Dueseldorf bridgehead was led by armored cars, while cavalry debouched from Duisburg into Muelheim. One division of infantry marched into the valley from Dueseldorf and another from Duisburg.

Two reserve divisions of infantry are camping on the edge of the former bridgehead limits.

The French set out from the Dueseldorf and Duisburg bridgeheads at 5 a. m., while the Belgians came down from Meers through Barbot and made a junction with the French outside of Muelheim.

At ten o'clock General Boyer, the first French soldier to enter Essen, reached the city hall.

Up to this afternoon the occupation had been carried out without any loss of life or even the firing of a single shot.

### AMSTERDAM, Jan. 11.—(By the Associated Press)—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Berlin today asserts that the German government has decided to take the following measures immediately after the French occupation is accomplished:

First—The peace treaty will be declared broken and its execution declared inoperative.

Second—Germany will no longer negotiate with the reparations commission unless this injustice is removed.

Third—The use of alcoholic liquors will be reduced.

Fourth—Sunday will be declared a day of national mourning.

### Railroading in Erin

DUBLIN, Jan. 11.—(By Associated Press). A map issued by the Southern and Western railway shows that during the past year the right of way of the line has been amareed at 375 places. Forty-two engines have been derailed, 93 bridges destroyed and 96 signal cabins and other buildings razed.
