MAIL TRIBUNE SECURES SERVICE, RADIO MARKETS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Senator McNary, chairman of the joint committee preparing the annual agricultural appropriation bill, today stated that the committee had adopted his amendment appropriating approximately \$150,000 for the extension of the daily market news service to the Pacific Coast.

The market news service, the senator said, is the collection and dissemination of news concerning prices, movements of products to the markets and market conditions in general. The means of communication is maintained by a leased wire service. At the present time, this service is in use in the New England states and most of the southern and middle states, and has proved to be of incalculable value to the farmers living in the served areas of the country. At this time, the service does not extend beyond Omaha, Nebraska, and the appropriation in question will permit it to be extended through the intermountain states to the Pacific Coast from southern California to northern Washington. The two principal stations will be located at San Francisco and Portland.

There has been a strong and insistent demand throughout the unserved portions of the country for this service, including the demand from The Mail Tribune for the news to broadcast over the Virgin radio, and Senator McNary said he would try and hold the amendment in the senate and in conference.

The four principal lines of agricultural production—livestock, fruits and vegetables, dairy and poultry products, hay, seeds and cereals, are included in the service, which not only seeks out market movements, but reports upon the spread in price quotations, and covers the entire subject of various grades and qualities, where congestion prevails, and other news that bears upon the market situation.

PACIFIC LEAGUE MEETING BREAKS UP IN BIG ROW

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 16.—The meeting of the Pacific Coast Baseball League broke up here today when directors representing the Oakland, Los Angeles, Salt Lake City and Portland clubs walked out following their refusal to vote on a refusal granting the Vernon club equal territorial rights with the Los Angeles club at Los Angeles.

When president W. H. McCarthy put the resolution to a vote, Vernon, San Francisco, Seattle and Sacramento voted for it, but the other four clubs refused to vote. President McCarthy announced it had been carried, 5 to 4, then corrected himself, saying five to nothing, his own vote making the fifth affirmative.

J. Cal Ewing of the Oakland club then said: "As long as you are adopting these high-handed methods, you had better run the league yourself."

Following this declaration, the representatives of the four objecting clubs walked out and after their departure the meeting formally adjourned.
