GIGANTIC THEATRE TRUST IS FORMED

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Control of the majority of the theaters in the United States showing legitimate enterprises and not those of New York city alone, was thought to be one of the aims of the proposed merger of the Shuberts and A. L. Erlanger and perhaps several of the independent theater owners. Confirmation of rumors that the deal was pending was obtained last night from both Mr. Erlanger and Lee Shubert. The plan is said to involve approximately \$50,000,000 and calls for sale of part of the stock to the public. It is estimated the Shuberts and Erlanger already control about four-fifths of the theaters of the country, exclusive of motion picture houses.

LIGHT OPERA CO. HIGHLY PRAISED BY MEDFORDITE

The American Light Opera company, with our old fellow townsman, Ed Andrews, in the stellar lead, will arrive in Medford Sunday morning next, to open a three days' run at the Page on Monday evening, with "The Bohemian Girl," followed by "The Mikado," "Chimes of Normandy" and "Pinafore," in all of which Mr. Andrews will appear in his well-known roles.

Alan Bracknerood, who has recently returned from a visit in Portland, speaking of the reception given to the company there, said:

Largest Freighter On Pacific Sold As Junk

SEATTLE, Jan. 18.—Sale of the steamship Minnesota to a New York firm to be broken up for junk, announced in New York advices, marks the passing of the largest freight carrier under the American flag and the largest vessel of any description ever to operate in waters of the Pacific ocean, according to shipping men here. Because of its immense size, the Minnesota, first operated by the Great Northern Steamship company in the trans-Pacific routes, proved highly unprofitable and was later transferred to the Atlantic. The Minnesota and her sister ship, the Dakota, were built at New London.
