### Apples Selling in Chicago at Two to 4 Dollars a Barrel

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—(Weekly Fruit and Vegetable Review)—The fruit and vegetable market this week was subjected to a shippers' barrage of apples, cabbage, potatoes, onions, lettuce and celery.

The United States bureau of markets reported today that about 10,000 more cars of fruit and vegetables were received this week than last. Apples led the attack, with about 14 cars arriving at market. This fruit was strongly supported by onions, spuds, lettuce, celery and other vegetables, all showing decided increases in shipments.

As a result of this extraordinary movement, the market fluttered considerably. Onions alone remained firm.

Onions ranged from \$2 to \$3.25 a hundred pounds on the various markets; apples were quoted from \$4 to \$6 a barrel; cabbage ranged from \$20 to \$30 a ton and potatoes ranged from \$1 to \$1.40 a hundred pounds.

U. S. Shipping Vessel Saved. MANILA, Jan. 18.—(By the Associated Press)—Advises from the shipping board freighter Patrick Henry say that she has been floated from the reef which she struck on Monday off Sibay Island, 200 miles south of Manila, and probably will leave for Manila tomorrow. The vessel will discharge her sugar cargo before going to drydock at Olongapo.
