

# Y. M. C. A. BASKET BALL LEAGUE TO OPEN ON MONDAY

The opening game of the Y. M. C. A. Athletic League will be played Monday, Jan. 22, between the Baptist and the Presbyterian teams at the Vinson barn on North Riverside. The second game of the evening will be between the Christian and North Methodist teams on the same floor.

A large and enthusiastic crowd of players and church folks assembled at the new hall last Monday night to look over the newly renovated and equipped quarters, which are to house the Medford Y. M. C. A. games for the next three months. The occasion was the final arrangements regarding practice periods and game schedules. As finally decided games are to be played regularly on Monday nights, the first game of the evening starting at 7:15 and the second at 8:30. Fifteen minutes grace is to be allowed in each case, after which the game will be declared forfeited.

Practice days were decided by lot an dell as follows: during the current week the North M. E.'s are to have Tuesday, the Christians Wednesday, the South M. E.'s Thursday, the Presbyterians Friday, and the Baptists Saturday. As some days are more desirable than others, it was decided to shift every team back one day each week, making practice days next week as follows: Tuesday, Jan. 23 Christians; Wednesday, Jan. 24, So. M. E.; Thursday, Jan. 25, Presbyterian; Friday, Jan. 26, Baptist; Saturday, Jan. 27, No. M. E.

The game schedule for the season is as follows (the 7:15 game is mentioned first, the 8:30 game second): Jan. 22, Baptist vs Presbyterian.

Christian vs South M. E. Feb. 19 Baptist vs North M. E. South M. E. vs Presbyterian. Feb. 26 Christian vs North M. E. Baptist vs Presbyterian. Mar. 5 South M. E. vs Baptist. Presbyterian vs Christian. Mar. 12 Baptist vs Christian. North M. E. vs South M. E. Mar. 19 Christian vs South M. E. Presbyterian vs North M. E. Mar. 26 South M. E. vs Presbyterian. Baptist vs North M. E.

The newly elected executive committee of the Jackson County Farm Bureau met in Medford, Wednesday, Jan. 17, for the purpose of formulating plans for the coming year.

It was found that the finances of the Bureau were in much better shape than they were a year ago. It was gratifying to find that a goodly number of members have already paid their dues for the year 1923.

The matter of strengthening the membership of the Bureau was the chief topic of discussion. The willingness of the business men of the county to cooperate with the producers was considered and a tentative plan was outlined for building up a substantial membership and for outlining a program of constructive work for 1923.

Committees to work out the details of these plans were appointed and Saturday, Jan. 27, was set as the time for giving these plans definite form.

The committee expressed themselves as feeling very well satisfied with the progress made by the Farm Bureau in the past and they feel that the future work of the organization to mean much to Jackson County farmers and Jackson County business men.

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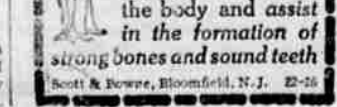
