ASHLAND GIVES MINSTREL SHOW FOR 1ST COMPANY

ASHLAND, Jan. 19.—The initial appearance of a specific saxophone band and trombone sextet will mark the advent of the Dixie Jubilee Minstrels at the Armory in this city on Friday evening, January 19. There will be 65 local people in the cast, including boys, girls and adults, consequently the big show will be a "home talent" one, strictly speaking, although quite a number of the actors have acquired a semi-professional status by virtue of graduating from amateur ranks. The show is a benefit one in behalf of First Company, and the high school band, hence should be well patronized in the way of encouraging "home industries." A saxophone band exclusively is going some in a town of this size, an innovation which will be featured along with a multiplicity of other notable attractions. The attendance promises to be a record-breaker.

Lots of things going on Friday evening this week. Among them an observance of the third anniversary of national prohibition at the Methodist church, a fine program being in prospect of commemorating the event.

Tuesday evening, January 30, will chronicle an important social event in the annals of the Chamber of Commerce, that date being reserved for the annual banquet, which this year will be held at the Depot Hotel, 7 o'clock prompt, hence plan accordingly. The tariff will be only a dollar per plate, and the feast of reason following will be as interesting as the dinner is superb. Prof. Vining, Leo Ferguson and Rufus Detrick constitute a committee having arrangements in charge. Landlord Schilling is the new manager of the Depot Hotel, and will be at home to a large number of guests at this interesting episode in the chamber's history.

The grand commensal proceeding, Temperance organization, for the year 1922 contains a fine portrait of Charles W. Nims, of this city, past grand commander of the order, accompanied by a brief biographical

sketch, stating that Nims was born in Chicago, Illinois, in 1869, in early manhood being employed by the Chicago & Northwestern railroad. In 1904 he came to Ashland entering the grocery business, since which time he has been actively identified with the various Masonic bodies in this city, notably the Commandery.
