Wheat Supply Increases. NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—The visible supply of American grain shows the following changes: Wheat increased 2,536,000 bushels; corn increased 1,378,000; oats decreased 222,000; rye increased 39,000; barley increased 69,000.

Wheat Exports Decline. WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Exports of wheat from the United States for the week ending January 20 totalled 2,960,000 bushels, the department of commerce announced today, as against 3,523,000 bushels during the preceding week.
