William Hovey of Redding, Calif., is visiting friends and relatives in this city for a few days.

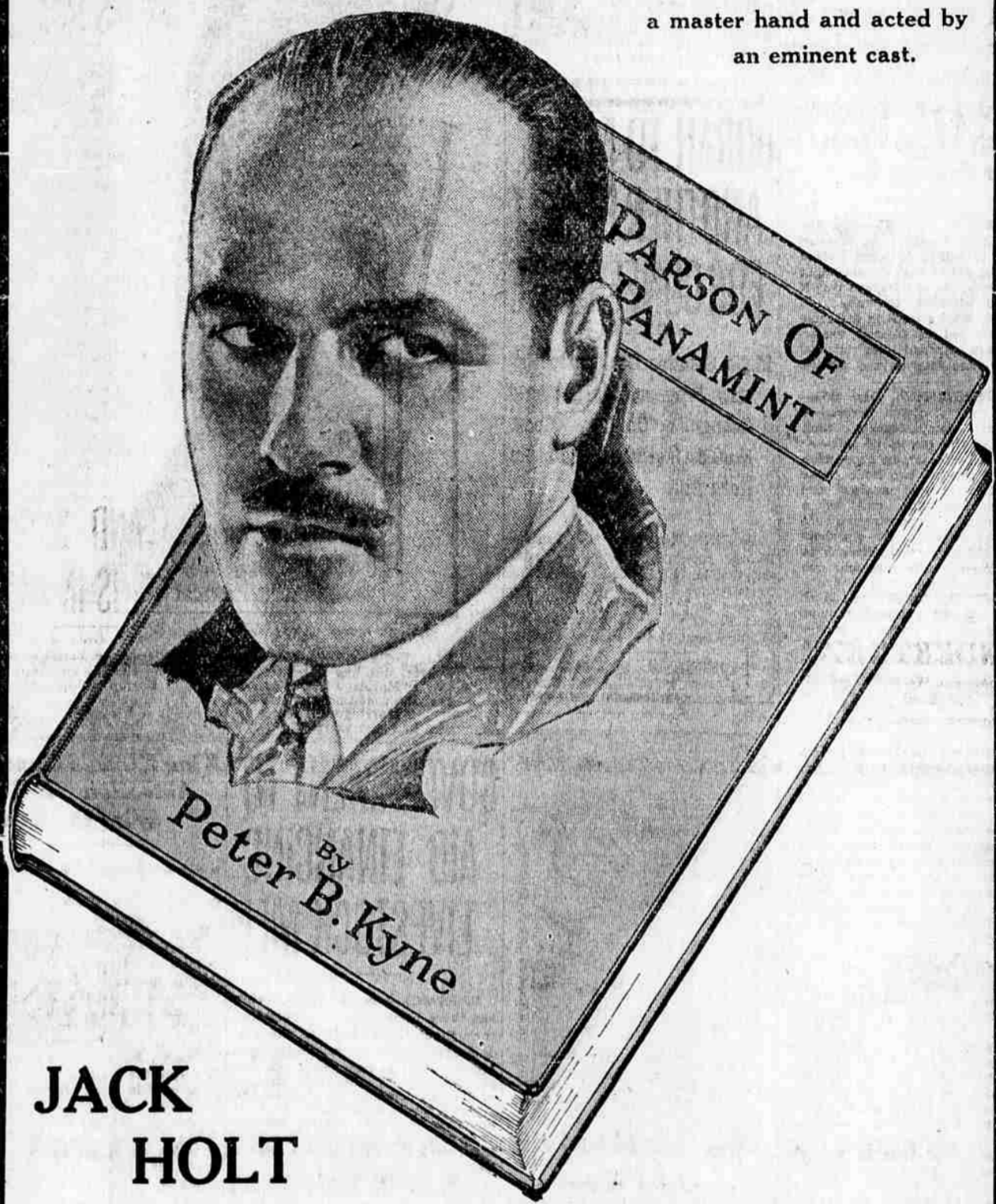
