IMPERIAL WIZARD IN CHICAGO WILL FIGHT TRADUCERS

CHICAGO, Jan. 25.—(By the Associated Press.)—Imperial Wizard Hiram Wesley Evans and three other imperial officers of the invisible empire, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, became visible in Chicago today with the announced intention of making a thorough investigation of action against Klansmen here, particularly with reference to the Klan investigation by a council committee. The imperial wizard indicated that the Klan was ready to fight and declared that "vicious, unfounded reports involving the Klan" will not be suffered by his organization. He announced that in connection with the investigation of hooded band troubles at Mer Rouge he would make a formal reply after analyzing the statement made public today by Attorney General Cocco of Louisiana in which he charged the Klan with numerous outrages.

PORTLAND SHIP BURNS IN PACIFIC

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 25.—The schooner Defiance, anchored at Faisi, in the Solomon isles since late December on account of trouble between Captain R. M. Clark and members of the crew, burned to the water's edge Tuesday, according to a cablegram received here today from Captain Clark by Ernest E. Johnson, head of the ship brokerage company bearing his name. Arrangements have been made by United States Consul Wormouth at Sydney with Commissioner Tulagi at Faisi to send Captain Clark, his wife and crew to Sydney. They will return to the United States.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC EARNINGS INCREASE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25.—The net revenue of the Southern Pacific company from railway operations in 1922 was \$68,845,713, an increase of \$11,932,610, compared with the 1921 revenue, the company announced today. The net railway operating income of the company in 1922 was \$46,222,846, an increase of \$10,276,055 over 1921. The net railway operating income is obtained by subtracting rents and other fixed debts from the net revenue.
