

HOW TO INCREASE FRUIT PROFITS BY \$100,000 PER YEAR

The profits from the fruit industry in this valley can be increased by at least one hundred thousand dollars annually by properly controlling the nodding moth. It is not necessary at this time to call attention to the enormous amounts of fruit destroyed by the pest every year, since most of the growers are well aware of this loss. Conservative figures place this loss at far more than a hundred thousand dollars in Jackson county alone. That this loss can be largely prevented has been well demonstrated by experiments carried on in this valley during the past five years by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Saturday, January 27, at 2 o'clock in the Medford public library, Mr. Feltner and Mr. Van Leeuwen of the U. S. Bureau of Entomology, will give the growers the results of their five years' work on the life history and proper methods of controlling the nodding moth in Jackson county. These men have spent their entire time in studying this one pest, and have probably made the most exhaustive studies ever made anywhere of this insect and methods of controlling it. This will be the last opportunity of hearing these men as their work here is completed, and on February 1st, they will leave to carry on similar work in other states. This meeting will be held in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Fruit Growers' League. Matters of very vital importance to the fruit industry will be discussed. (Continued from Page One) Leading industrial and commercial firms have issued a similar appeal to employers and workers throughout the rich. Meanwhile the government has been brought face to face with a deficit of between one trillion and three hundred billion and one trillion and

six hundred billion marks. The departure of the American troops from the Rhineland is marked by universal regret. The press fears that the path of the French will thus be made easier. PARIS, Jan. 25.—(By the Associated Press)—Announcement of General Weyand's appointment as high commissioner of the Ruhr district is said on good authority to be waiting for the French cabinet to decide differences which have arisen over the selection of an officer not directly under the war office for so important a post. It is understood that Premier Poincaré chose General Weyand because he was recommended by Marshal Foch, who still is regarded as the head of the inter-allied forces.

German Police Assist French. ESSEN, Jan. 24.—(By the Associated Press)—Normal conditions so far as street demonstrations or rioting are concerned, were resumed throughout the Ruhr valley today, but unemployment is steadily increasing, the railroad strike continues and navigation is at a stop on the Rhine between West and Cologne. Some 124,000 coal mine workers are idle. Nineteen arrests were made in Düsseldorf in consequence of last night's affray and General DeGoutte has announced the German security police will be severely punished for their failure to remain on post and maintain order. The general, however, has congratulated the Essen police for the effective assistance they afforded the French patrols in quelling the disturbances here. International railway trains which normally should cross the Ruhr valley are being re-routed by way of Sarre and Kibersfeld. French military train crews are insuring sufficient service to bring supplies for the troops, but are not moving trains with food for the civilian population of the valley.
