

CENTRAL POINT TO HAVE A NEW MOVIE THEATER

CENTRAL POINT, Jan. 26.—The Central Point opera house is being modeled by Mr. Seyburn of Medford. The upper story is to be torn down and a flat roof put on. Every detail will be made modern so as to give to the community a good theatre. Several years ago Mr. Frank Hull erected a theatre in this city, but since then nothing has been done along this line. This is a much-needed establishment for all of the people here to go to Medford if they wished to see a show, but more enjoyed at home. A few road shows appeared here a while back, but they were discontinued to stop isolating the town from such entertainment. Now that Mr. Seyburn is going to establish one it will be very much better for the entire community, for money will be spent at home instead of other places. It will draw more people to this city, as there will be an attraction for them. The prices will be cheaper than they are at the present time. The pictures that they will be of the same quality or better than shown at other places. A large crew of carpenters is now at work rushing the work along and it is estimated that it will be completed within a month. This building a short time ago was used as a basketball hall, but the idea was given up on account of the condition of it.
