\$5000 IN PRIZES FOR AUTO RACES HERE THIS JUNE

The details of the big automobile and motorcycle race meet which is to take place at the fair grounds on June 15 and 16 were ordered to be perfected by the directors of the fair association at their meeting last week.

The calls for the appointment of committees on races, publicity, track and grounds, concessions and ticket seller and gatemen.

The tentative outline for races covers purses amounting to \$3500 plus the entry fees, which will bring the total up to some \$5000 for two days racing. A great many inquiries have already been received as to what the purses will be, length of races and other details so that the directors feel confident that the best drivers on the coast will be attracted here.

The directors ordered an application being made for membership in the North Pacific Fair and Racing associations. It was decided that two harness races be held each day during the fair next fall and they appropriated \$250 for each race, making a total of \$2500 offered.

In addition to the 180 trees that are to be planted on the fair grounds next month, the forest service has offered to secure native trees and shrubs to fill in on the landscaping planned.

The building of a half mile horse track and the enlargement of the grand stand were given consideration.

School children of Klamath, Siskiyou and Josephine county are going to be admitted free on the last day of the fair next fall, providing they are accompanied by parents or guardian.

Applications for space for commercial displays from firms who did not exhibit last year, have been received so that the advertising which the fair offers has been recognized.

CLARENCE REAMES FILES \$8750 SUIT FEDERAL COURT

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—Clarence L. Reames of Seattle, former United States attorney for Oregon, filed suit in the federal court here Saturday to collect \$8750 attorney's fees from F. Klevenhausen, president of the Columbia & Northern Fishing & Packing company.

Reames alleges that Klevenhausen employed him in a suit brought March 12, 1919, by the alien property custodian to confiscate his salmon canneries at Fort Wrangle and Alton, Wash. The government seized the plants in the belief that they were owned by Klevenhausen's relatives in Germany. The federal court here at a recent hearing returned the plants to Klevenhausen, holding that the government had failed to disprove the claim that he, and not German interests, owned the capital stock. To keep assets of the concern intact, Reames requested a court order requiring Klevenhausen, the company, the alien property custodian and the Astoria Savings bank from disposing of any of the property now in their hands. In the event he is given a judgment Reames also asked a court order directing the sale of the property, provided Klevenhausen does not make immediate settlement.

MUSTAPHA KEMAL MARRIES HEIRESS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 29.—(By the Associated Press)—It is reported that Mustapha Kemal Pasha, Turkish nationalist leader, was married today to the daughter of a rich Turkish merchant of Smyrna, Mouamerou Chaki Bey. Mustapha Kemal's bride is said to have brought him a dowery of one million Turkish liras.

MEDFORD BOOZE PEDDLER FINED \$500, PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—"I'll give him the limit," said Federal Judge C. E. Wolverton, Saturday, after he heard the evidence against Tom Olson, confessed rum runner. But the limit did not please the court, as it was but a \$500 fine. The judge mourned that the Volstead act carries no jail clause for first offenders.

Olson was arrested December 18 at Medford, while driving an automobile loaded with liquor from British Columbia to California. He left his machine in a garage over night and garage employes discovered the whiskey. The word soon spread about the case, and by the time the police arrived, nine of the 20 cases had disappeared.

Olson appeared only by attorney Saturday, as he is in jail at Medford in default of \$2000 bond, facing trial on a state liquor charge.

COLLINS, EMMENS PURCHASE PRIZE STOCK FOR RANCH

George T. Collins returned last night from the Willamette valley where he has been for several days purchasing some pure bred livestock, which are to be used as foundation stock on the Meadowbrook ranch at Eagle Point, which he and Dr. Emmens recently purchased from Fred Pelouze.

The shipment, which consists of a carload, is expected to arrive Tuesday or Wednesday in charge of O. A. Mack, superintendent of the ranch. The shipment consists of two registered pure bred Percheron mares, purchased of A. C. Ruby, the well known breeder of Portland. This team was used by Mr. Ruby as the lead team on a six horse hitch at the Pacific International, and one of the team was grand champion for four years. Each horse weighs close to a ton and are perfect specimens of the heavy draft type.

In the shipment there are also twelve head of pure bred registered Jersey cows, five of which were purchased from the Biersdorf herd and the balance from the Johanson herd, both of whom are leading breeders of Jersey cattle in the northwest. Two or three of the cows have silver medal records and are eligible for gold medals. All of these cows have been tubercular tested and are from
