

# EX-SPOKANE MAN BUYS RESTAURANT IN GOLD HILL

GOLD HILL, Jan. 31.—E. J. Reinkings who has been operating the Blue Front restaurant in Gold Hill the past two years has sold the business to T. F. Gillespie, a recent arrival from Spokane, Wn., who has already taken charge. The new owner will make some alterations in the building, put in a modern oven and do a gen-



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eral bakery business in connection with restaurant. The Reinkings have moved their household effects to their farm on Galls Creek and will later leave for Oakland, Calif., where they will likely take up the restaurant business in the city. They have leased their farm, known as the old Lawrence property, to Frank Lawrence of Medford, who now owns the south portion of the premises.

# BASKETBALL IS NOW THE RAGE IN ASHLAND TOWN

ASHLAND, Jan. 31.—From prospective hotels, quarry development, and newspaper purchases, all these phases of improvement pending development, one is compelled to dwell upon some other subject for the time being. That subject is basketball. One of the local outlets to have a dual title, some terming it the Sunday school league, while others declare that it applies to the Junior Y. M. C. A. aggregation; practically the same thing as the teams are all denominational and orthodox at that. An age limitation is in effect, admitting only those who are under 18 years of age, Jan. 1. The schedule begins January 27, and will be continued each Saturday thereafter until March 3 inclusive. The initial games developed the fact that the Christian and Methodist teams will prove invincible, two contests being held each date, the Army being the scene of the encounters and the hour set at 10:30 o'clock. Incident to the preliminary last Saturday, the Christians won over the Baptists by a score of 44 to 16, the Methodists defeating the Presbyterians 48 to 1, practically a walk-away. The schedule for the remainder of the season follows: February 2—Baptists vs. Methodists; Christians vs. Presbyterians. February 10—Christians vs. Methodists; Baptists vs. Presbyterians. February 17—Christians vs. Presbyterians; Baptists vs. Methodists. February 24—Baptists vs. Christians; Methodists vs. Presbyterians. March 3—Baptists vs. Presbyterians; Christians vs. Methodists. The series is being conducted under Y. M. C. A. auspices for the double purpose of increasing Sunday school attendance and incidentally affording an impetus in behalf of physical training, no admission being charged. The general public are welcome to attend and afford moral encouragement to the respective teams either from a secular or denominational standpoint.

The annual directory of the Masonic bodies is being gotten out for delivery by mail in the near future. Its quota of nearly \$3000, levied in behalf of the Masonic home, has been paid in full, and its grand lodge dues and home maintenance fund for 1922, amounting to over \$650, have also lately been paid without deductions.

Incident to the banquet tendered recently to the Ashland and Salem high school basketball teams by a contingent of local railroad men, somebody got their fingers crossed, inasmuch as the decorations displayed in the banquet room were blue and white, whereas the colors should have been, complimentary to the Salomons, red and black, an error in printed effects which will necessitate the being repeated sooner or later.

On February 2 a special entertainment will be Prof. Switzer's illustrated lecture on the wild flowers of Oregon—a rare treat, admission to be by membership ticket, with the nominal charge of a dime only to outsiders, all being cordially invited. The club now has over one hundred members.

Captain H. A. Canady of Medford will address the meeting on this subject with opportunity afterwards for free discussion by those present.

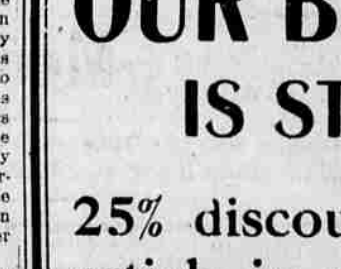
Light refreshments will be served during the social hour, with a general good time for all, and a brief meeting for business.
