TED THYE WINS A GREAT MATCH FROM M. YOKEL

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 2.—Ted Thye of Portland, claimant of the light-heavyweight wrestling title, beat Mike Yokel of Salt Lake and Wyoming here last night in a spectacular match, two falls out of three.

The first fall came after 58 minutes 12 seconds with a wrist lock applied from a standing position. Yokel rushed at Thye, at the beginning of the second round, headlocked him and nearly twisted his head off, until Thye at length, dizzy and groggy, stepped into another headlock. This time Yokel pinned him for the fall, in 28 minutes, 10 seconds.

With one fall apiece which put the two men about on an equal footing, and 23 minutes left to wrestle out the third and deciding fall they threw caution to the winds when they came back to the mat.

In rushing Thye for a headlock position Yokel's arms slipped over Thye's head and as the veteran went past Thye grabbed him around the middle, lifted him bodily from the mat and slammed him to the canvas. Thye dropped on top of him and pinned Yokel's shoulders to the mat. This fall came after eight minutes and three seconds.

Rasanta Singh, welterweight, made short work of Frank Pilleng, Canadian,

flopping him with a short arm scissors in 29 minutes and 30 seconds.

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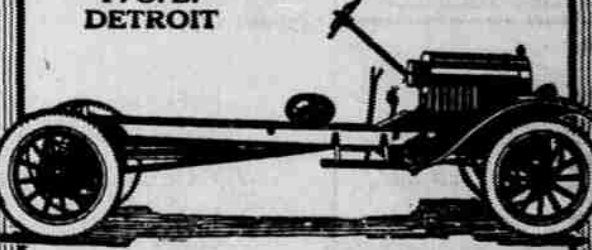
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
