ASHLAND MAN IS ELECTED HEAD OF LOCAL SPORTSMEN

At the banquet of the Jackson County Game Protective association last Saturday night, which was the largest and most successful in the history of that body, the following officers for the ensuing year were unanimously elected by the 300 sportsmen present.

President, Harry Hoeler of Ashland; secretary and treasurer, E. W. Gould of Medford and the following list of eleven vice-presidents: Alex. Sparrow, of Medford; Louis Dodge of Ashland; J. Johnson of Gold Hill; Frank Elliott of Rogue River; James Grieve of Prospect; George Barker of Butte Falls; James G. Love of Central Point; Royal Brown of Eagle Point; F. C. Reimer of Talent; Chester Fitch of Phoenix and Billie Coleman of Jacksonville.

It was midnight before the banquet was ended. Among the late speakers were Ray Steel, United States game warden for the states of Oregon and Washington and Floyd Crocker of Roseburg, who brought greetings from the Douglas county sportsmen, Stanley Jewett, United States predatory animal inspector for Oregon, was down for a speech and was in the city to attend the banquet, but had to leave for Portland shortly before the festivities began, in response to an urgent telegram.

State Water Commissioner Udyke of Grants Pass was the spokesman of Josephine county sportsmen, in place of Wilford Allen, who was present.

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STILL OWNER IS FINED \$500 AND GIVEN 6 MONTHS

Harry Shields, arrested Saturday by Prohibition enforcement officers for possession of what Special Officer Sanderfer describes as the neatest and best equipped moonshining outfit, he has found, so far in Jackson county, was sentenced to six months in jail and to pay a fine of \$500, by County Judge Gardner this morning, upon his plea of guilty to a charge of possessing liquor.

Shields, a recent arrival from Wyoming, was operating on the place on Griffin creek, owned by J. H. Gustino (Gus the Tallor). It was erroneously stated in the Sunday issue, that the land belonged to Gus Samuels, former city treasurer.

The prohibition forces believe that Shields was making ready for a wholesale campaign in this county, and that he has several co-workers who came from Wyoming with him, but have not been definitely located. This was one reason for the stiff sentence handed out to him.

The arresting officers report that the still was made entirely of copper and that everything connected with the plant was scrupulously clean. The product is also alleged to have been fit to drink.

The cases of M. M. Hefflin and Mrs. Nora Dunlap, arrested last week for alleged violations of the prohibition law, were postponed today until tomorrow, by County Judge Gardner, after hearing the arguments for a dismissal, by the defense, which was denied.

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
