

SOUTHERN PACIFIC DOUBLES OUTPUT REFRIGERATOR CAR

A large portion of the \$12,000,000 to be spent by the Southern Pacific and of the \$18,000,000 to be spent by the Pacific Fruit Express company, in which Southern Pacific owns a half interest, for new equipment for 1922, will go into Western channels of trade and for western labor.

The Southern Pacific announced yesterday that it will build 500 logging cars in its shops at Sacramento and will build 75 caboose cars in its Los Angeles shops. The Pacific Fruit Express has already awarded the contract for 1923 refrigerator cars to the Pacific Car and Foundry company at Seattle.

ONLY FOUR STATES FREE OF LYNCHING CHURCH DECLARES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—"Only four states in the Union have never had a lynching," according to a statement issued today by the Commission on the Church and Race Relations of the Federal Council of Churches. They are Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Hampshire and Vermont.

There are only three other states that have had no lynchings since 1889—New Jersey, Utah and Connecticut. Nine other states have had a clear record during the last ten years. They are Nevada, Colorado, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana, Delaware and Pennsylvania. This means that only 33 per cent of the states of the Union have not had a lynching in the last ten years. At the same time it is pointed out that 83 women have been lynched since 1889. The churches are engaged in a nationwide campaign against lynching and facts are being gathered.

"The total number of persons lynched by years gives a startling picture of lawlessness," the statement continues. "There was a slow decrease from the climax in 1892 and 1893 down to 1908. During the latter year and 1909 there was an increase, then another slow decrease until 1918, when a tendency to increase was again manifested."

"The sex of the victims in the cases where a record has been made shows an alarming number of women. Since 1889 there have been 53 women, 17 white and 36 colored, killed by mobs. Some of them were put to death with savage tortures, such as burning and disemboweling. Such brutality might be expected in pagan times or heathen countries, but by no means in a civilized land today."

Every three out of four of those lynched during the period from 1885 to 1921 were black. In this connection the statement says:

"The list of victims of mob violence reveals the slough of prejudice out of which the evil springs. From 1885 to 1921, inclusive, 1028 white persons and 3,069 colored persons were slain by lynchings. The number of white victims, however, has rapidly decreased since 1900. Among the victims classed as white were a German (during the war), Italians, Mexicans and Jews—indicating that lawlessness spreads where prejudice abounds. Except in two years since 1903 the number of white victims has been less than ten each year. The number of negro victims during the same period has fluctuated slowly downward to range between 50 and 100 except in 1902 when the number reported was 104 and in 1917 when the number reported was 38. There is some evidence to indicate that during recent years negroes have been lynched and the facts concealed from the press, so that no record has been secured."

Protestant churches throughout the country will observe Sunday, February 11, as Race Relations Sunday, when they will begin a campaign of education against lynching.

7TH DAY ADVENTISTS MEET IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6.—Approximately 200 leaders in the Evangelistic work of Seventh Day Adventists throughout the Pacific Northwest are assembled here for the first of a ten day series of meetings to be held under the auspices of the general conference of the church.

Those in attendance includes ministers, missionaries, educators, physicians, officers and treasurers, departmental field secretaries and other conference workers. The presidents and members of the executive committees of the seven conferences located in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Alaska are also in attendance.

FRANK P. WALSH TO DEFEND REDS ST. JOSEPH, MICH.

CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—(By the Associated Press).—A "labor defense counsel," including among its officers, a former United States district attorney and four ministers and church leaders, has been formed to organize the defense of alleged communists who are to go on trial February 26 at St. Joseph, Mich., charged with advocating the overthrow of the United States government.

The organization has retained Frank P. Walsh of Kansas City and Washington and other counsel to defend the prisoners who include William Z. Foster, Charles E. Rutenburg and others who have been well known as radicals.

The stationery of the defense counsel includes the names of Eugene V. Debs, Frank Fisher Kane, United States district attorney at Philadelphia under President Wilson; Haynes Holmes, pastor of the community church, the Rev. John A. Ryan of Washington, professor at Georgetown university; Norman Barr of Chicago, associated with Olivet Institute, Baptist organization; Dr. John A. Lapp of Chicago, director of the social activity department of the National Catholic Welfare council; Francis C. Lillie of Chicago, daughter of R. T. Crane, wealthy iron master and J. G. Brown of Chicago, national secretary of the farmer-labor party.

Others named include Hulet M. Wells, former president of the Seattle Central Labor council, and George F. West, San Francisco labor leader.

MUSSOLINI WILL ORGANIZE POLICE FORCE OF 80,000

ROME—The whole of the Italian police service is being reorganized under the government of Premier Mussolini. The Royal Carabinieri will remain as the principal police force of Italy, while the Royal Guards will be abolished and their personnel absorbed into the carabinieri. The number of detectives on the Italian police force will be increased from 6000 to 12,000.

The Royal Carabinieri have been the backbone of the Italian police force for over a century. Their history is filled with glorious deeds connected with the rise and unity of all the separated Italian states. They are noted for their picturesque appearance, and present a colorful contrast to all the other police of Europe. Their tunics resemble the coat of an evening suit, with the tails bordered in deep red. Across the chest several strands of white leather cross each other, and are designed to carry their knapacks. Their headgear consists of a large felt hat peculiarly shaped, and resembling the hat usually worn by Napoleon.

While the Royal Guards, which organization was instituted by former Premier Nitte, will be abolished, not all the guards will be taken into the Royal Carabinieri. The Royal Guards number approximately 40,000 and only half that number will find berths in the enlarged organization of Carabinieri. The remainder will be discharged. The addition of 26,000 Royal Guards to the Carabinieri forces will increase the latter body to 80,000.



ALL CHOKED UP?

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ARRESTED MAN'S CONFESSION MAY JAIL SIX OTHERS

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 6.—A promise of "a clean breast" of his connection with the affair, was brought from Austin H. Montgomery, Jr., former New York broker, in the Los Angeles county jail early today, by officers who arrested him yesterday on charges of using the mails to defraud in deals said to aggregate \$3,000,000.

"I'll make a clean breast of my connection with this affair," officers quoted Montgomery. "The men who are back of the deal are merely trying to make me the victim. When I get to New York, I will make a statement to the government officials that will put six men in the penitentiary and some of them are known to every broker on Wall street."

Montgomery, with a number of other men, including his father, was indicted after an investigation of the affairs of the Community Finance company with offices in New York and Baltimore.

Swedish Prince Departs. SEATTLE, Feb. 6.—Prince Waldemar of Denmark and his son, Prince Eric, traveling incognito on the Danish motorship Peru, were to leave here for Tacoma today after visiting since their arrival Saturday from San Francisco.
