LIQUOR VIOLATION CASE NEAR END

The trial of M. M. Hoffin and Mrs. N. Dunlap for alleged violation of the "nuisance clause" of the Prohibition act, is expected to be concluded late today in County Judge Gardner's court at Jacksonville. The opening arguments of the state were made this morning by District Attorney Rawley Moore. Attorney Roberts will open for the defense this afternoon.

The trial has lasted three days—a record for Jackson county justice courts, and 15 witnesses were called, ten for the state and five for the defense. Six of the state's witnesses were members of the raiding party.

PUBLIC UTILITIES TAX TO GET 10 PER CENT SLASH

SALEM, Feb. 7.—At a joint meeting of assessment and taxation committees of house and senate tonight, discussion of house bill 283 relating to increases of taxes on public utilities, brought to the defense of equitable taxation many of the state's public utility men. A full and complete discussion of the measure which was introduced by Representative Kirkwood, developed many important phases of the business of the state's public utilities not heretofore generally understood. The final crystallization of the situation occurred when Senator Dennis, chairman of the meeting, announced that the new tax program, including house bill 141 and companion measures, would be reported out by the committee and provide for only for assessment of all property in Oregon at full value, but also provides for machinery to enforce the measure.

Under new taxation plan many public utility men present expressed confidence in the work of the committee and the belief was freely expressed that the utilities would be treated with the same fairness that all other property will receive. Believing that the work of the assessment and taxation committees is by far the most important feature of the present session, Governor Walter M. Pierce announced he would call a joint meeting of the house and senate Friday noon and in a special message will urge the two houses to adopt the taxation program of the tax committees, placing foremost Senator Dennis' bill providing for a ten per cent horizontal cut in all tax levies for the years 1923 and 24. The meeting was addressed by Franklin T. Griffith, Arthur Spencer, Ben C. Day, A. A. Smith of Portland and H. L. Walther of Medford.
