

BUILDING PERMITS ISSUED, 2 ARE HELD FOR ACTION

A number of building permits have been granted by the city council, which body has also held up two applications until a further investigation can be made by the council committee on buildings. The permits issued include the following:

To R. Schuler, for a frame garage 18x22 feet in dimension on east side of S. Riverside, between 9th and 12th streets, to cost \$850; to Snider Dairy and Produce company, permission to raise the corrugated iron roof of its building on east side of North Bartlett street at a cost of \$750; to Benjamin Webb, to erect a frame addition, 14 by 16 feet on north side of East Jackson street, to cost \$100; to Mason Motor company, to make eight alterations in the garage building on North Holly between West Main and West 6th streets, at an expense of \$30.

The applications held up for more complete investigation were one by George Adams for the construction of a frame poultry house of two rooms on north side of Eighth 8th street, west of Peach street, to cost \$500, and another by Ray Toft for a frame one story addition to a building, about 14 by 20 feet and of two rooms on the north side of West 10th street between Laurel and King streets.

'LITTLE PHIL' BACK, CIRCUS CLOWN, IS HELD FOR MURDER

HOUSTON, Texas, Feb. 8.—"Little Phil" Algin wanted in Los Angeles to answer to a charge of murder, is in jail today at Angelton, Texas, after he was landed from the Freeport Sulphur company's tanker No. 6 at Freeport. Algin, who had been in chains since yesterday, was taken off the boat shortly before nine o'clock. He seemed in good spirits and told reporters how he was arrested and deported to the United States from Mexico.

HOUSTON, Texas, Feb. 8.—The Freeport Sulphur company's boat No. 6 from Mexico, docked at Freeport, Texas at 8 o'clock this morning bringing Phil Algin, wanted in Los Angeles to answer to a murder charge. "Little Phil" was in chains. He was accompanied by immigration officers. A large delegation of Texas officers was waiting at Freeport to put him formally under arrest. The latest plan is to turn Algin over to Police Chief Goodson of Houston, who is at Freeport and who will bring the prisoner here to await the arrival of Los Angeles Chief Oakes, who is due here today.

"Little Phil" also told reporters that he did not kill Detective Sergeant Fitzgerald at Los Angeles with whose slaying he is charged. "I got away and someone had to take the blame," he declared. "That one was me."

He said he had been traveling in this country with a circus as a clown before going to Mexico.

DAYLIGHT ENTRY OF HOME - REPORTED

The residence of Mrs. Nona Dunlap, Sixth and Bartlett streets was broken into Wednesday morning, between nine o'clock and noon, and the home given a thorough rummaging, but as far as known nothing of value was taken. Entrance was gained by breaking down a side door. Mrs. Dunlap was in justice court at Jacksonville when the entrance was effected, and discovered the crime, when she returned for lunch. She reported the matter to the police, she said.

LADY LEGISLATOR TAKES FALL OUT OF FISH MEMBERS

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 8.—The senate today referred back to the fisheries committee for re-consideration current resolution No. 10 which embodies the recommendations of the joint committee for Oregon and Washington legislatures that met in Seattle last Saturday relative to fishing in the Columbia river.

Senator Mrs. W. S. Kinney of Astoria, objected to the resolution declaring that Astoria and the lower Columbia river were not represented on the special committee, but remarked "Representative Hurd, who knows more about the habits of clams in a seaside chowder than he knows about fish, and some of the senators who know more about the habits of cows in the cow counties than they know about salmon, were named on the committee."

Senator R. S. Farrell of Portland declared that if the resolution were not adopted it would show bad faith with the Washington legislature. "Why should we be afraid of bad faith with the Washington legislature?" asked Mrs. Kinney. "The Washington legislature never has kept an agreement with us."

FARMERS WOULD BENEFIT MOST BY SHIP SUBSIDY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The farmers more than any other group interested in the country would benefit by the immediate passage of the shipping bill now pending in congress, Senator Jones of Washington who has charge of the bill in the senate, declared in an address read today before the convention of the National Merchant Marine association.

Senator Jones was unable to appear and his prepared address was read by Winthrop L. Marvin, New York, vice president of the American Steamship Owners' association. Senator Jones declared that the shipping bill by "equalizing the difference in cost" of American and foreign ship operation would mean for the farmer American transportation instead of foreign transportation.

"The high shipping rates which the people had to pay before American ships were built," Senator Jones stated, "went largely to alien ships owned or controlled by great trusts over which we had no control. If we had built a merchant marine our farmers and business men would have been saved hundreds of millions of dollars that went into the coffers of these foreign ship owners and would have saved hundreds of millions of tax burden."

"We want a merchant marine. The farmer, the businessman and the laborer agree in this, and the measure we urge is a concrete proposal to establish what we all want."

Representatives of shipping interests and of more than 150 commercial organizations throughout the country were here today for the convention. Attention of the meeting will be directed to the situation regarding American shipping which the shipping bill pending in congress is designed to meet.

GREEK REPRISALS IN THRACE TOLD

SOFIA, Feb. 7.—Advises from the frontier declare the activity of irregular bands in Thrace is on the increase and that several Greek military posts along the Maritza and in the interior were attacked. The Greeks, undertaking several measures in reprisal, are said to have occupied several points along the Maritza and near the Adrianople station of Karagatsch.

The Turkish and Bulgarian population of Thrace is reported moving toward the Bulgarian frontier.

The concentration of the Greek troops in western Thrace is reported completed. The Greek military authorities are reported to have punished 200 Greek officers for laxness in discipline.

Indian Suicide Was Crazy
PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 7.—Chief Gabriel Whitehorse, full blooded Indian and war veteran who killed himself in New York yesterday for love of a white woman, was Gabriel Hattins, escaped inmate of the Arizona state insane asylum, according to Dr. A. J. Wheeler, superintendent of the Phoenix sanitarium here.

News Summary of Last Night

DUESSELDORF.—French authorities announced the death penalty would be inflicted on Germans caught tampering with railroad equipment or signal boxes or for other acts of sabotage endangering the lives of travelers.

MTZ.—The strike of coal miners in the Saare valley was spreading into Lorraine.

NEW YORK.—Mrs. Frances Noel Stevens Hall, widow of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall, who was murdered last September at New Brunswick, N. J., with Mrs. Eleanor H. Mills, sailed for Italy.

NEW YORK.—Monseigneur Ernesto Filippi, apostolic delegate to Mexico, recently expelled from that country, was a "victim of a conspiracy," according to a report forwarded to Rome by churchmen today.

NEW YORK.—The engagement of Richard F. Cleveland, son of Grover Cleveland, twice president of the United States, to Miss Ellen Douglas Gailor, daughter of the Right Rev. Thomas F. Gailor, presiding bishop of the Episcopal church in America, was announced.

DEMPSEY'S FATHER SERIOUSLY ILL

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—Jack Dempsey on his arrival here today en route to Salt Lake City, where his 69 year old father is reported seriously ill with stomach trouble, said that if his father's condition permitted moving him, he would take him to Rochester, Minn., to consult specialists. Of the New York boxing situation, Dempsey said he anticipated adjustment and believed his manager, Jack Kearns, will be able to arrange at least two bouts for him. The champion boxer expressed the belief that Jess Willard, from whose brow Dempsey snatched the crown in Toledo, should be able to beat Floyd Johnson, Iowa heavyweight, when they meet next May in New York.

RUSSIAN REFUGEES ASK ASSISTANCE

MANILA, Feb. 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Governor General Wood today presented to the Philippine legislature a petition by Admiral Stark and his officers for permission to engage in inter-island trade the eleven Russian ships in which they brought refugees from Vladivostok recently. The petition asks that this privilege be granted temporarily until the final status of the Russian refugees is determined by the government at Washington. The legislature is expected to dispose of the request soon.

army in Asia Minor. The commissioners replied that the warships would remain where they are. To this, LeMatin continues, the Turkish authorities announced that they would compel the craft to depart unless they went of their own free will. The British and French commanders then received orders to reply immediately to any attack. If such an incident arises, the newspaper asserts, no power, however anxious to preserve peace, would be able to limit its effect.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Turkish order that the allied warships must leave Smyrna was discussed at a meeting of the French cabinet today.

The French government is exchanging views with London and Rome regarding the procedure to be followed in the efforts to reach a state of peace. Until further developments, it is understood in French official circles, the Lausanne conference will be considered still in being and will be regarded as finally terminated only when the general secretary gives notification.

It is supposed that all the allied ships are remaining at Smyrna. These include the French cruiser Ernest Renan, the French destroyer Somail, the British cruiser Cambrian and the Italian cruiser Venetia, besides the Dutch warship Admiral Tromp and four American destroyers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The Turkish orders for allied warships to depart from Smyrna were interpreted today by naval officers here as having no application to the American destroyer Edsall, the only American craft in that port.

It was pointed out the Edsall was less than the 1000 tons size limitation on warships fixed by the Turkish government and also that it could not be regarded as an allied warcraft to which the Turkish action presumably applied particularly.

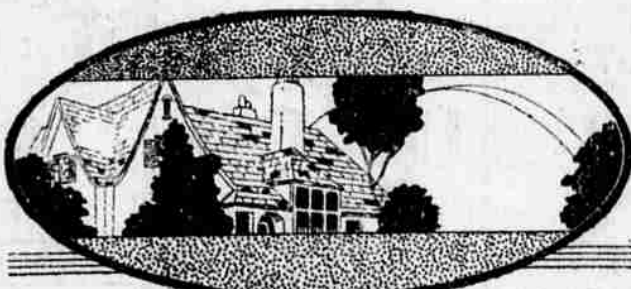
