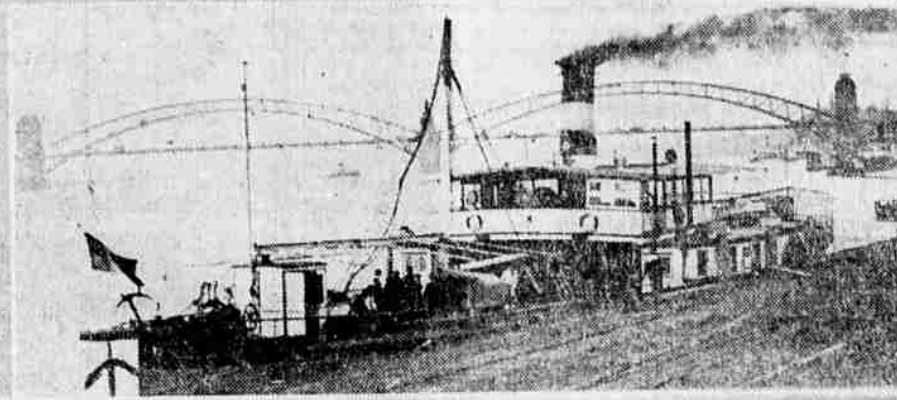

French Guard Railroads and Patrol Rivers in Ruhr Invasion

DUESSELDORF, Feb. 9.—(By the Associated Press.)—French soldiers aided by tanks broke up a demonstration at Recklinghausen yesterday. Not a shot was fired. Generally speaking the Ruhr situation remains unchanged. German resistance is even more staunch than ever. There are reports that agents from Berlin are canvassing the Ruhr villages and towns, urging the workers to resist and strike. The military authorities have decided to arrest and put in jail all members of the protection police who refuse to salute French officers.

Food is becoming scarcer and su-

per is unobtainable here. The French plan to lift the duties for such foodstuffs as are now taxable.

Except for a military train, the Rhineland, Ruhr, Treves, Mayence, Coblenz and Ludwigshafen divisions are at a complete standstill. Hundreds of tons of coal are in the yards outside Duisberg waiting transportation to France. Three trains left yesterday.

The forces of occupation now maintain a fleet of 21 tugs on the Rhine. The French have permitted three train loads of coal consigned to Switzerland to pass the Ruhr frontier at Brackeln. Another train destined for

Holland was cleared from Friederichsfeld.

The French threaten an embargo on steel and iron manufacturers as well. They threaten to stop the importation of iron ore except from Lorraine also.

The German industrialists assert that their plants will be forced to shut down within a week if imports of iron ore are cut off.

The miners are now receiving 12,500 to 15,000 marks a day, with a bonus of 520 marks for a wife and each child. The steel workers' wage scale on 1200 marks an hour went into effect yesterday, retroactive on February 1.

115 MINERS ENTOMBED IN DAWSON HORROR

the explosion, but there has been no disorder.

One hundred and forty-one miners entered the mine yesterday, but 19 of them had checked out before the explosion, so that 122 men were in the mine when the accident occurred.

The fire bosses who examined the mine on the night preceding the explosion, did not report any unusual conditions in the property. The cause of the explosion has not been determined.

The ventilating fan was so located

and installed that it was not damaged by the explosion and continued in operation. The main force of the explosion passed through the intake air way, which is the main haulage road and on reaching the surface demolished the concrete portal. Subsequently the haulage way caved in at that point.

The mine, which was one of the smaller of the eight mines operated here by the Phelps-Dodge corporation, had a capacity of about 600 tons a day.

A statement by the Phelps-Dodge corporation here to the Associated Press at four o'clock this morning, said:

"Owing to the fumes which permeated the mine following the explosion, very little hope is entertained that any of the men who were in the mine will be found alive."

The explosion was of such force that it toppled cement walls which formed the exterior of the entrance and hurled large timbers 50 to 100 feet.

The explosion was heard all over Dawson and the thud brought a group of anxious wives, mothers, and other relatives to the pit head. The women, some hatless, despite the winter breeze; others tightly wrapped in shawls, some tight-lipped and dry-eyed while others were sobbing hysterical, waiting for some sign to indicate whether their men folk would be brought from the mine. The news quickly spread that the miners had small chance to escape alive.

Early this morning the body of A. J. English was found almost completely buried in the debris. Further on the searchers expected to find his son, Albert English, Jr., foreman of the mining shift.

With the arrival of the mine rescue car sent by the Colorado Fuel and Iron company from Trinidad, Colo., early today, rescue work was pushed with redoubled energy.

Many members of the rescue crew have been working from 10 to 12 hours without rest. W. D. Brennan, general manager of the mine, was one of the most energetic workers in the rescue party from the time of the explosion until three o'clock this morning when exhaustion forced him to seek rest.

The work of entering the mine and excavating through the caved-in tunnel is a task which presents no little risk to the rescue party.

The fumes in the mine are dense, despite the use of the large mine fan. During last night and early today, four members of the rescue crew have been overcome by the fumes and have had to be carried out of the mine by their comrades. All were revived, however. Many of the rescuers have been struck by falling rock.

The walls and ceiling of the tunnels are shaky and workers frequently are forced to retrace their steps to clear the tunnel of debris that has fallen behind them.

The advance guard of the rescue workers is equipped with oxygen helmets.

DAWSON, Feb. 9.—Shortly after 8 a. m., today a temporary morgue was opened in an office building near the scene of the disaster. It soon
