

LINCOLN BANQUET HISTORY RECITED, NEXT ONE MONDAY

To the Editor:

In the early spring of 1914, a number of Jackson county republicans were discussing the low estate to which the republican party of this county had fallen. They had discovered that while there were thousands of individual republicans, there was no republican organization, no cooperation and no confidence existing between the different units of the party.

The only daily newspaper in the county was owned, and its editorial policy controlled, by a violently partisan democrat of large newspaper ability, and whose methods were ruthless. Few men could be elected to office without his support, none could be appointed to office without his O. K. The situation was wholly deplorable, both from the standpoint of wholesome politics and of good government.

Within the boundaries of Jackson county are fifty-six political subdivisions or precincts, each entitled to a committeeman elected by the people. The party morale was at such a low ebb that but few of these precincts had elected committeemen, or if such had been elected, they had failed to qualify.

Many republicans viewed the situation as hopeless, and stoutly maintained that a political organization could not be built up under the Oregon system. However, a small organization was formed, consisting at first of not to exceed a half dozen men. Candidates for precinct committeemen were placed on the ballots at the May primary election. After the primary all of these committeemen qualified and met within the
