PEACE FOR IRISH DELICATE, ORDER HANGINGS HALTED

LONDON, Feb. 10.—(By the Associated Press)—The consensus of opinion among English correspondents in Dublin is that time will reveal the effect of Liam Devey's appeal to the republican leaders.

Reconsideration by the republican leaders is not regarded as hopeless. In some quarters it is predicted that Liam Lynch's reply did not bar the door to all negotiations.

According to a Dublin dispatch to the Times, the fact that the government has suspended all executions is a hopeful sign. The correspondent says that a number of prominent republicans are under sentence of death and that their safety may weigh with their friends, whose powerful influences will be brought to bear on both sides to end the quarrel, because it is generally recognized that if this opportunity for peace is allowed to slip away, another chance may not present itself soon.

The Dublin correspondent of the Westminster Gazette reports that Devey who issued the appeal is "an insignificant follower whose authority to appeal to DeValera and Lynch is subject to very serious discount."

Much attention and speculation are given to President Cosgrave's visit to London, where he and his colleagues are being guarded by the police with extraordinary care.

One story is that the visitors are trying to obtain Great Britain's consent to an increase of the free state army, which is said to have reached already the limit prescribed by the treaty. Another report connects Mr. Cosgrave's visit with questions of finance, alleging that the free state is desperately in need of money, having been unable even to pay the Dublin police force for the past fortnight. Some newspapers say Lord Carson attended one of yesterday's conferences at the colonial office. The reason for his reported presence is unknown.

SHIPPING BILL UP IN SENATE FOR DEFINITE ACTION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—The administration shipping bill was called up in the senate again by Chairman Jones of the commerce committee with the announcement that it would not be laid aside except by a vote of the senate.

Taking the floor after the senate had passed the army appropriation bill, Senator Johnson asserted that "we are now ready to proceed with the shipping bill and we will pass it or we will reject it as the majority of the senate shall determine."

Senator Jones indicated that except by vote of the senate the bill would not be laid aside to permit approval of the debt funding agreement with Great Britain and that this procedure was said by other senate leaders to have the approval of President Harding, with whom Senator Jones conferred early in the week.

SHIPPING BILL TO LEAD WAR DEBT BILL IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Although the senate finance committee was meeting today to consider legislation by which the house approved the British debt settlement agreement, the time of senate action on it was problematical.

The shipping bill has taken a position ahead of the funding legislation in the senate, Chairman Jones of the commerce committee having called up the former measure yesterday immediately after passage of the army appropriations bill. He announced that the ship bill will not be laid aside except by a vote of the senate and its consideration ahead of the debt agreements was said by other senate leaders to have the approval of President Harding, with whom Senator Jones conferred early in the week.

Although a movement was under way today among some members of the senate farm bloc to get the shipping bill laid aside, supporters of the bill were confident the move would be frustrated.

The house voted approval of the British debt funding agreement by an amendment to the existing funding statute which not only would specifically approve the terms of that agreement but also would authorize the American debt commission to make settlements "similar, but none more favorable in terms," with the other debtor nations.

News Summary of Last Night

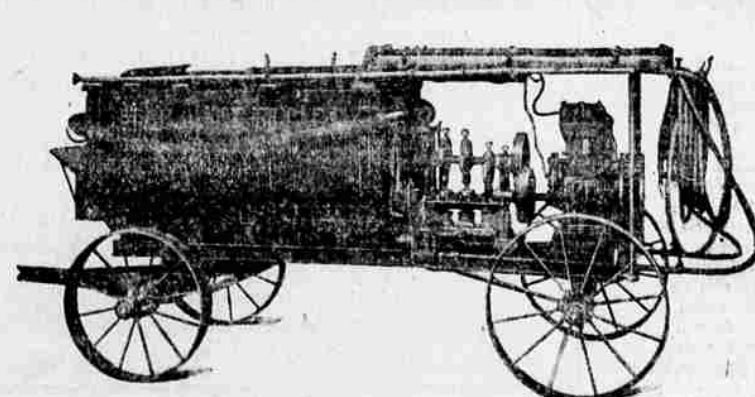
