

FLYING SQUADRON TO GIVE MEETINGS HERE FEB. 24TH

The Flying Squadron, called a "University in Motion," a Convention on Wheels, will reach Medford for a series of meetings beginning February 24th, and will continue for three days at 2:30 and 7:30, in the interest of law enforcement, civic righteousness, social and industrial justice.

The First Christian church, through pastor, Rev. D. E. Millard, and the official board, has been graciously offered, and will be used for the entire series. Plans are under way for a union service Sunday evening, February 25th. The local committee is composed of Rev. D. E. Millard, Mrs. S. L. Leonard, president W. C. T. U., and Rev. F. R. Leach, pastor of the Baptist church.

These meetings are to be held under the auspices of the Flying Squadron foundation and in cooperation with the ministers and local W. C. T. U., according to announcement made today by R. S. Middleton, Indianapolis, Ind., advance man for the foundation, who was in the city completing the arrangements for the coming of these speakers. He stated this was a part of the nation-wide campaign that is being conducted, and that Medford would be the 463rd city to be visited by these speakers where a series of three days meetings will be held, and Oregon was the 44th state to be covered. He stated the speakers for the first afternoon and evening will be Frank S. Regan, III, and Fred W. Corbett, L. L. D., Lansing, Mich. These two speakers will be heard at 2:30 and 7:30 p. m. Regan is a lawyer and a noted tax expert. He is also one of the leading cartoonists on the American platform. He illustrates his lectures. Corbett is a logical thinker. His arguments are indisputable.

James H. Woertendyke of Chicago will be the speaker for the second afternoon and evening. At the close of his afternoon address he will conduct a law enforcement conference, giving any who may wish an opportunity to ask questions relating to the violation of the enforcement of the eighteenth amendment.

Hon. Oliver W. Stewart, president, Flying Squadron foundation, editor of the National Enquirer, formerly member of the Illinois legislature and one of the outstanding characters in national reform work, will be heard the afternoon and evening of the third day. Rev. Norma C. Brown, Bloomington, Ill., will also deliver two addresses on the third day. Miss Brown served as chaplain of Illinois senate in 1921, being the only woman ever to serve in the capacity in that state.

There is no admission charge to any of these meetings and the entire series are open to the public.

526 COWS TESTED DURING WEEK

The record week's run in the present tuberculosis drive has just been completed. One hundred and three herds with five hundred and twenty-six cows were tested.

This carries the work to Tolo, in the valley proper. On Monday of next week cattle owners of Eagle Point will bring their cattle to two central points. R. A. Weideman's place will be the scene of the first stop, at nine o'clock. A. E. Denton's for the other end of Eagle Point will be visited at ten o'clock.

As much of the territory above Eagle Point will be worked on Monday as possible and the herds as far as Lake Creek will be tested by Tuesday night. Cattle owners are urged to have the cows and young stock tied up to aid in hastening the work.

On Tuesday of this week the second shipment of infected animals was sent to be disposed of in Portland.

Trap shooting will hold the center of the floor until the early spring when the fishing season opens in earnest and it is planned at that time to hold a fly casting tournament and arrange for other activities closely related to the consuming interest felt by local sportsmen in the supreme sport of angling. A trophy for the largest steelhead caught on tackle specified by certain regulations also may be awarded by the club as its membership grows.

The matter of a duck lake was also discussed and with time, plans for extensive conveniences that will make the club grounds a Mecca for Southern Oregon sportsmen, are expected to develop. It is planned to have the organization balanced and capable of satisfying the legitimate desires of angler and hunter no matter what his or her particular outdoor hobby may be.

The membership committee which embraces a number of the most prominent exponents of sport in the valley and in outlying districts as far as Prospect and Butte Falls will start a membership campaign in the near future to have every bona fide sportsman in Southern Oregon a member of the club. The organization will work hand in hand with the Jackson County Game Protective association.

WHITE DEFEATED BY R. KANSAS

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Decisively defeated by Rocky Kansas, the two by four fighting man from Buffalo, Charlie White of Chicago, who has been near to a world's boxing championship more times perhaps than any other man, today is farther away than ever before. Charlie took a severe beating from Rocky during 15 rounds of mugging at Madison Square Garden last night.

It was Rocky's fight from the start and virtually every round was his, though in several sessions Charlie did jolt his opponent when he thought he was being shown up too badly.

White had been promised a bout with Champion Benny Leonard for the lightweight title if he defeated Kansas, whom Leonard beat last summer. Whether Kansas will get another whack at the champion is less certain.

The Chicagoan appeared unusually unaggressive. It may have been due to weakness precipitated by time spent in a Turkish bath whence he went to reduce his over poundage to save forfeiture of \$2,500.

PARIS, Feb. 10.—(By the Associated Press)—Battling Siki is restored to good standing in the boxing game and is re-instated with the titles taken from him as a result of his various escapades when the French boxing federation voted his twentieth anniversary next month. It was asserted today by his attorney, M. Deimont.

Upon recognition again of his status as heavyweight champion of the world, said M. Deimont, the various titles brought by Siki following his qualification will be dropped.

SENTENCES PASSED IN BOOZE CASES

Sentence was passed this morning by County Judge George Gardner in the cases of M. M. Hefflin, Mrs. Nona Dunlap and Mrs. Babe Glenn, found guilty of violation of the "nuisance clause" of the prohibition act, after a three days' trial.

Mrs. Nona Dunlap was sentenced to serve 90 days in jail, and pay a fine of \$500, with the proviso that if she served ten days of her jail sentence the remainder would be suspended.

Mrs. Babe Glenn was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail, and pay a fine of \$200. The bond of Mrs. Glenn was fixed at \$500.

M. M. Hefflin was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail, and pay a fine of \$200.

The sentencing of Ray Carpenter was again deferred.

Notice of an appeal to the circuit court was given by attorney for the defendants.

would reduce the salary of the adjutant general of Oregon from \$4,500 a year to \$3,000.

Senator H. L. Corbett of Portland introduced a bill providing a property restoration fund for all state institutions.

The compromise consolidation bill was introduced today carried the names of seventeen senators. Immediately following its introduction in the house the rules were suspended and the bill was put through second reading and referred to the committee on state and county offices.

Senator S. M. Garland, a democrat, who is chairman of this committee, stated the measure would be reported back to the senate early next week.

Governor Pierce, who was furnished with a copy of the bill, said it met with his approval except for a few amendments which he said Senator Garland would incorporate in the bill.

The bill retains the present board of control, composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, which is to have jurisdiction over all state institutions except the prison, which, as now, is to be under the control of the executive.

The superintendent of banks is to remain under the jurisdiction of the board of control. The highway commission and public service commission remain as at present, except that after the terms of the present public service commissioners expire, the governor shall appoint the members.

The state welfare commissioner is given the work of the industrial accident commission, board of inspectors of child labor, industrial welfare commission, state board of conciliation, commissioner of labor statistics and state board of health.

A commissioner of agriculture is charged with the duties now performed by the dairy and food commissioner, scaler of weights and measures, pure food board, lime board, horticultural board, sanitary livestock board, live stock branding board, dairy bull registration board, station registration board. These commissioners are appointed by the governor.

Remaining provisions abolish and to various boards and bureaus.

Int ways and means committee introduced a \$250,000 Assef bill with a favorable fee-bill provides for the purchase of four per cent 28-year bonds for \$1,000,000. The first six years' interest is to be paid during the last six years of the life of the bonds.

DEATH LIST MOUNTING.

the heart of the mine. A burst of flame and dust shot from the mouth of the main tunnel. The blast occurred somewhere in depth. Exterior concrete work shattered.

mine, who led the first rescue crew into the still gaseous interior, was overcome by gas and exhaustion and late last night was just recovering from the effects.

Albert E. English, Jr., mine foreman, is one of those whose bodies have not yet been found.

A coroner's jury which began its work last night will resume this morning the viewing of the bodies and the investigation of the disaster.

DAWSON, N. M., Feb. 10.—Covered with a thin blanket of snow which began falling at midnight, Dawson this morning continued to search for her dead in the torn recesses of mine No. 1, owned by the Phelps-Dodge corporation, wrecked Thursday by an explosion.

With the recovery shortly after six o'clock this morning of five more bodies in the shattered passage ways, the total number of dead had reached 41.

According to figures given out by the corporation's officials, there were 122 men in the mine when the explosion occurred. Of this number two emerged yesterday morning unharmed. Seventy-nine still remain in the mine.

The work of recovering the bodies is proceeding rapidly today. New shifts of workers are entering the tunnel every few hours and repair men are working step by step with those who are searching the ruins for additional bodies.

Only a small knot of spectators stood about the mine entrance early today. Two days of realization of the enormity of the catastrophe have given relatives and friends of the entombed miners a spirit of resignation which is reflected in their unemotional demeanor.

Hope has been abandoned virtually that there are any men still alive in the mine. Experienced mining men here point out that mine No. 1 is a dry mine, particularly at present. With the exception of cross cut No. 4, from which the only two survivors of the disaster escaped, and one other cross cut where the mine, the tunnels are barren of water. This indicated, they asserted, that it would be impossible for the entombed miners, if any survived the explosion and sealed themselves in isolated compartments to exist for any considerable length of time.

Reports of the survivors yesterday that they had heard voices in an adjoining passageway during Wednesday night, give rise to the belief that at least four men still lived inside the workings.

CUMBERLAND, B. C., Feb. 10.—When the bodies of 33 miners killed in Thursday night's explosion in No. 4 mine of the Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir) Limited had been brought to the surface today, officials of the company expressed the belief that one more body remained in the mine, making the total list of dead 34.

Funeral arrangements for the victims had not been completed this morning and it had not been decided whether a public funeral would be held tomorrow as at first planned.

Taking of evidence by a coroner's jury impaneled yesterday, has been postponed until February 16.

CUMBERLAND, B. C., Feb. 10.—Investigation of an explosion of fire damp in mine No. 4 of the Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir) Ltd., near here Thursday night, the death list of which stood this morning at 33, has been halted to await clearing the workings of extensive masses of fallen rock.

Meanwhile additional details of the struggle to reach the mouth of the tunnel, two miles from east drift No. 3, where the blast occurred, were related by Robert Brown.

Brown and J. Gibb were working some distance from the scene of the explosion. Soon after they started to fight their way out of the bore. Today Brown and Gibb, companions of Jack Webber in the Cumberland hospital where they are among the six men hovering near death, know that their struggles were useless. The air in the chamber where they had been at work remained pure and last night a mule was brought out alive. Brown and Gibb stopped to pick up Webber, six men passed them on the run. Carrying Webber, the two soon after came to the bodies of these six, who had run into after damp. Warned by this, they turned back. Next they encountered a Chinese known as Big Sullivan, who said he could lead them out. They ignored his offer. He made his way to the outside unharmed while the three white

men were so far gone when they were taken that Thursday night they were reported among the dead.

Webber after a time recovered enough to walk and the three tried to get up a slope. Encountering after damp they turned down the slope following two attempts and in a short distance collapsed. They were found by a rescue party that heard their groans and then saw the electric lights on their hats.

Webber had been knocked down where Gibb and Brown came upon him by a string of cars that had run away when J. Froloni, a boy who was driving the mule hauling them, was instantly killed.

No explanation has been offered for the tragedy. An explosion last August in the same mine that took thirteen lives was attributed to ignition of fire damp by an electric spark that flashed when a cable leading to an electric drilling machine broke. The nearest electrical machinery, a pump and a compressor, were a hundred feet from Thursday night's explosion and neither device was in operation at the time.

A coroner's jury that was impaneled last night viewed the 31 bodies that have been brought out and then adjourned until February 16.

Fourteen of the bodies recovered were those of white men and 17 Chinese. Two Chinese are believed to be dead in the mine.
