

OREGON GROWERS UPHELD IN SUIT FRUIT DELIVERY

SALEM, Feb. 14.—A contract for the delivery of a product to a cooperative association can not be evaded by side stepping. The supreme court this morning upheld the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association in its suit against August Lentz involving a contract for the delivery of loganberries. Lentz, prior to the time for marketing his crop sublet his farm to his son, who refused to deliver the berries to the cooperative association.

The association brought suit to compel delivery and won out in the lower court, Lentz then appealing to the supreme court which today has affirmed the decree of Judge Bingham of the circuit court.

"As the contract in question is not oppressive, unjust or illegal and its enforcement by mandatory injunction restraining the defendant from selling his product contracted for to any one except the plaintiff will work no hardship on the defendant and as the plaintiff is clearly entitled to the relief requested the decree of the circuit court is affirmed," Justice Rand writes in his opinion.

This meeting, to which all of the local shareholders have been invited will be attended by members of the board of directors of the company, including Joseph D. Grant, chairman of the board, and John D. McKee, president.

These gatherings are in line with the company's policy of making its customers holders of stock and welcoming them to frank discussions of Copco's problems and activities.

It gives to those who wish to become more efficient in marksmanship an opportunity in that line at a very slight cost, and marksmanship attained through this system is recognized by the national association.

To members in local organizations such as Medford has, is furnished by the department rifles and ammunition free of charge to be used, and it also gives the members opportunity to purchase supplies and ammunition at Government prices for themselves. The regular U. S. Army rifles are furnished for indoor target practice. Great benefit can be derived from this form of sport and practice.

For several years the organization in Medford, which at one time had about 100 members, has done nothing in the way of target practice, but many have signified their interest to again take up this work and operate under the National Rifle association rules and therefore a public meeting will be held on Thursday evening that all interested may be present.

MAJORS MAY FORM NEW LEAGUE TO CURB AA CLUBS

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Baseball circles were stirred today over the reported formation of a new eight club circuit, sponsored by the major leagues, among eastern cities in the United States and Canada, as a drive against Class AA minors in the draft war. The new league would be called either the continental or inter-al-lig.

While reports that the proposed league would have the backing of the majors drew denials from Commissioner K. M. Landis, John A. Heydler, president of the National league; Ban Johnson, president of the American league and others, Edward G. Barrow, secretary of the Yankees, admitted he had been offered the presidency.

It was said that the new league would include clubs in Toronto, Montreal, Buffalo, Newark, Baltimore, Brooklyn, Washington and Providence.

PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 14.—Albert A. Exendine, selected yesterday to be football coach for Washington State college, will reach the Cougar campus in time for spring football practice, according to information available at the college today. Exendine succeeds Coach "Gus" Welch, resigned.

Exendine is the third Carlisle Indian to coach a W. S. C. team, Welch and "Lonestar" Dietz having preceded him. At Carlisle he was selected all-American end, later spending a year in the backfield. In 1910-11 he was head coach at Oberlin, Ohio, then followed two years with Glenn "Pop" Warner at his Alma Mater. He went to Georgetown, which he is leaving now, in 1914.

BOSTON, Feb. 14.—Pancho Villa, the diminutive Philino, was undisputed champion of flyweight boxers in this country today. Frankie Mason of Fort Wayne, Ind., former holder, was knocked out in the fifth round by Villa last night.

Mason had been considered to have lost his hold on the crown when he was beaten by Johnny Buff, although the latter weighed 116 pounds. Villa was almost generally accorded the title when he beat Buff at 112 pounds.
