

PUBLIC HEALTH ASS'N. TO MEET, ASHLAND, FEB. 16

ASHLAND, Feb. 14—An interesting midwinter gathering here will be the annual meeting of the Jackson County Public Health association, which convenes for an all day session, at the community clubhouse, on Friday, Feb. 16. The morning program begins at 10 o'clock, business routine occupying the earlier hours of the day, but in the afternoon reports from the county and school nurses, also various controversial will be discussed, incident to the success of the movement to have the county nurse's activities in the public schools continued. In the face of organized opposition exceeding ill-timed, will be particularly stressed. In these forward, aggressive movements, Jackson leads, other counties of the state follow. Among visitors from other portions of Oregon will be Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, secretary of the State Tuberculosis association, and Miss Benita Stroud, state public health demonstration agent, who as guests of this gathering will be cordially greeted. This being granted, other efforts of less magnitude though nevertheless important, are more easily accomplished, proving conclusively in spite of prevailing "isms", that a timely prophylactic overcomes many a physical, moral and mental handicap.

BRIBERY CHARGES AGAINST FORMER GOVERNOR FUTILE

ADA, Okla., Feb. 14.—(By the Associated Press)—Former Governor J. B. A. Robertson of Oklahoma stood freed today of charges that he accepted a bribe while in office to permit an Oklahoma bank to operate after it had become insolvent.

A demurrer to the indictment against the former executive which was returned by a grand jury in Oklahoma in March of last year was sustained in district court last night by Special Judge Hal Johnson of Shawnee. Judge Johnson held that the official acts charged in the indictment were not within the scope of the official duties of the governor and hence could not be the subject of bribery.

Mr. Robertson was charged with accepting a part of a \$25,000 bribe alleged to have been paid Fred Dennis, former state banking commissioner, to allow the Guaranty State Bank of Oklahoma to continue business when it was known to be in a failing condition.

Dennis, who was jointly charged in the indictment, has disappeared. The court held that the facts stated in the indictment could not form the basis of a new indictment.

Grant Gillespie, newly elected Oklahoma county attorney, gave notice of an appeal to the state criminal court of appeals.

Judge Johnson allowed the state 60 days in which to prepare the ap-

peal and ten days was granted the defense to suggest amendment.

The merits of the case were not argued.
