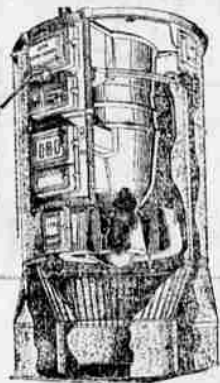

MANY SPEEDERS GIVEN FINES IN JUSTICE COURT

The first three days of this week were busy ones for Justice Glenn O. Taylor and deputy state motor vehicle inspector J. J. McMahon. Three traffic cases were taken before the local Justice on Lincoln's birthday and one was attended to yesterday afternoon.

Lawrence Myers of Central Point, was fined \$50 yesterday afternoon, after having pleaded guilty several days ago to a charge of failing to report an automobile accident. According to McMahon, Myers collided with the car of Mrs. L. C. Schaffer on the 29th of December near the Lincoln school. A wheel was torn from Mrs. Schaffer's car and she and her three little children were left sitting in the car while Myers backed away and drove off without offering any assistance whatever. He did not report the accident to authorities, as required under state law. Anyone having an auto accident is required by law to report it within 24 hours.

Mark Seymour was fined \$15 for speeding when he pleaded guilty on the 12th before Justice Taylor. Louis Vinmont was fined \$15 and was given a suspended jail sentence of ten days on a charge preferred by McMahon. The officer alleged that Vinmont drove a truck past the Washington school at a speed of 28 miles per hour. A plea of guilty was entered.

Grace Hall was fined \$25 and her driver's license was suspended for a period of ten days when she pleaded guilty to a charge of speeding. This was her second arrest on such a charge.

According to authorities speeding is becoming too prevalent and the failure to report automobile accidents is entirely too common.

Lumberman Is Killed
EVERETT, Wash., Feb. 15.—Ollie Dawson, aged 31, employee of the Elbey Logging camp, died at an Astington hospital Monday from injuries received when he was crushed between cars. He is survived by his wife and three children at Oso.

NEW SUPT. CRATER LAKE ARRIVES TO RELIEVE SPARROW

Charles G. Thomson the newly appointed superintendent of Crater National Park to succeed Alex Sparrow, recently resigned, and his wife and two young sons, arrived in Medford this morning, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Alex Sparrow, who went to Portland to meet them several days ago, and have been entertaining them in that city.

Their future residence plans until the Crater Lake season opens are uncertain as yet, but Mr. Thomson and family have taken temporary furnished apartments on West 10th street, corner of King street, and they went to these quarters from the train at once, chaperoned by Mr. Sparrow.

The genial new head of Crater Lake park, when a local welcome was extended to him for Oregon having such bad weather, especially up around Portland, since his arrival in the state, and the chilly and somewhat foggy weather of this forenoon here, smilingly said:

"Oh, that is all right and Oregon is all right. I well understand that this state has had unusual weather, but it is not bad at all. I've seen so much worse."

Neither did the new superintendent have anything to say as to his future plans for Crater Lake except that he hoped to get his feet on the ground as soon as possible, and referring to his remarks on that matter published in the Portland interviews with him and Mr. Sparrow. In this connection the Portland Oregonian published the following:

"I am going quietly down to Medford and slip into the place left vacant by Mr. Sparrow's retirement. I shall carry forward his plans. There will be absolutely no change in policy so far as I can prevent it, and so far as possible I want to have the same personnel. Mr. Sparrow is most highly regarded at Washington and the department was most reluctant to see him leave."

"The national parks are in for a great year," said Mr. Thomson. "Tourists have been going abroad to see devastated France, but that urge has about subsided. Never has there been such a desire to set out by automobile and be housed by a tent for the summer, taking in the national parks on the way. Crater Lake will get its share of this big movement."

"The Columbia gorge is wonderful," he told Alex Sparrow, retiring superintendent, who, with Mrs. Sparrow, came up from Medford to meet the new boss of the lake. "I saw it from the train coming in this morning."

"You haven't seen half of it," barked out Sparrow. "If tomorrow is a decent day we will go out there and really look it over. You have to get it from the highway."

"Thomson is showing the proper appreciation," confided Sparrow. "Wait until he sees the lake, that elfin sea of blue that, as Frank Branch Riley says, is the most perfect gem God ever made. Why, if there were no Crater lake at all, the 50 mile circle about it would still include the greatest outdoor country on the continent."
