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What Do You Think of Tithing System In Church Giving

Another appreciative audience attended the meeting at the Christian church last night. The music was fine and the sermon one of the best of the series.

Tonight a ladies' orchestra and the West Side ladies' quartette will render special music.

Subject of the sermon "Is Tithing a New Testament Command?"

On the subject "How Much Owest Thou Thy God?" Evangelist Bradford said in part:

"People in Christian America have accepted the old pagan theory of ownership until we hardly recognize God's ownership. The pagan theory was that God was an impersonal God and that personality was necessary to ownership, therefore God could not own and man was the owner. Will we assume that God has made ample provision for men and nature, and left the highest conception of his creation, the church, unprovided for?"

"Do we owe God a definite debt, or is it a hit or miss proposition of 'giving all we can?' For many years we have preached—some proportion for God. What is the only proportion mentioned in the Bible?"

"Abraham paid the tithe. His grandson, Jacob, made a vow to pay the tithe. Was it a coincidence that Abraham and Jacob paid the same amount? There was no written law. The law was not written for 500 years after. It was certainly the prevailing custom of the ages handed down through the patriarchs like marriage, the home, sacrifice and other laws. The nations of antiquity without exception paid the tithe to their deities. Did it just happen so?"

"All we are asking is to be just as fair and square with God as we are with men. The title is the Lord's. It is holy until the Lord and we are going to pay him, not because he needs it, badly as he does need it, but because it is His. If men violated their stewardship obligations to their government as they do to God, most of them would be in jail."

"The financial system in our churches is a failure because it is 'man made.' Instead of paying our God what we owe him, we are giving Him according to some man made system and in so doing, we cheapen the church in the eyes of the community."
