

PRESBYTERIAN MEN'S CLUB IS DULY LAUNCHED

An organization of the men of the Presbyterian church was effected at the gathering last evening which took the form of a supper and business meeting. Thirty-eight men sat down to the supper provided by the committee in charge of Carl Brommer, who has been an experienced restaurant man. The committee on constitution and by-laws brought in a report which was accepted, the name chosen was "The Presbyterian Men's Club," which will meet once a month, on the second Thursday night every month from October to May, inclusive.

Every attendant on the church services is eligible to membership whether he is a member of the church or not. The purposes of the organization will be to help build up the public class for men, stimulate the spiritual life and interests of the church, lead the men out in to the study of community problems and the application of Christian principles to the same, extend the activity of the church and its organization for helpful service to outlying communities to assist in the boys' work and any other line of Christian activity open for men.

The officers chosen were, president, Mr. A. F. Holstorka, a new member on the force of the First National bank, recently from Minneapolis; vice-president, Mr. Ernest Jaqua, head cabinet maker for the Trowbridge Cabinet works; Charles Kay, University of California, Berkeley; treasurer, C. E. Daniels of the engineering staff of the main offices of the California, Oregon Power company.

The working committees will soon be arranged and aggressive action planned. The organization promises to be one of the most aggressive of the Presbyterian church and is a manifestation of the growth and new interest in the work of this organization. Following the organization, several short addresses were made. Mr. James M. Albert and Mr. L. B. Cornell of Portland, members of the First Presbyterian church of that city and also representatives of the Alexander Hamilton Institute of New York City were present and spoke briefly of the splendid work of the men in the First church at Portland, and also of the strong underlying spiritual elements essential today for successful business. Mr. Matthews, a visitor also spoke very strongly of the great spiritual values for which the church stands and which should be central in such an organization as this.

WORLD HIKER MOURNS DEATH FAITHFUL DOG

Almost broken hearted over the loss of his faithful dog and sole companion on his 8,000 miles hike so far around the world, Sam Meadows, 21 years old, a former New York City newsboy, and infantryman at the Plattsburg training camp, walked into the city this morning from Grants Pass, where he spent yesterday, and will remain here today before continuing on his way to South America by way of California.

The dog, Rover, a fox terrier, had been with Sam since the long hike began, 11 months ago, and had slept by his side, cuddled up close to him every night since. Some fiend in human form, it is claimed has poisoned 18 dogs in Grants Pass during the past three weeks by throwing meat covered with strychnine around, and poor Rover got hold of some of the poisoned meat yesterday.

"I felt so bad and lonely last night that I could not sleep," said Sam in the Mail Tribune office this noon. "I was so nervous I thought I'd fly. You don't realize what an awful lot that dog was to me. You say I can get another dog—no I will never get another, could never get another like him. We shared everything together including our thoughts. I'll go alone the rest of the way."

Sam, who is a tuberculosis victim, lives outdoors whenever possible. He has traveled 8000 miles already, he estimates, and will add as many more thousand to that as soon as possible. He makes his way by selling cards at any price people feel like giving him.

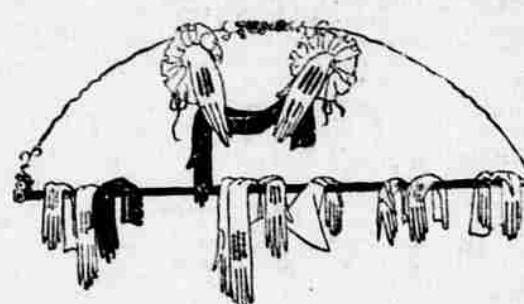
