

AW ENFORCEMENT FLYING SQUADRON HERE NEXT WEEK

With the third division will be the honorable Oliver Wayne Stewart, president of the Flying Squadron, and editor of the National Inquirer.

It will be remembered that Mr. Stewart was associated with ex-Governor Hanly in the old Flying Squadron of America.

REGON BANKS SHOW GAIN IN DEPOSITS

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 17.—Deposits in 281 banks in Oregon on December last aggregated \$256,255,595, according to a summary prepared by the superintendent of Banks Frank C. Jamwell. This represents an increase of approximately \$25,000,000 over the deposits of a year ago. Loans and discounts showed a decrease of more than \$2,000,000.
