LA FOLLETTE—DENIAGOGUE.

IN HIS opposition to the British debt payment plan, Senator La
Follette played the part of an unscrupulous demagogue.

Why not pay the poor American farmer these billions instead of
England, how much of this money will be spent to keep the Irish
people in bondage, etc., etc.

Senator La Follette knows better than that. He knows that the
payment of the British debt has nothing to do with a payment to the
American farmer, he knows that if the Irish people are in hot water
today it is not the fault of Great Britain.

But he takes advantage of the general rural unrest in this country,
and the perpetual Irish agitation to twist the lion's tail, and appeal
to unthinking prejudice and ignorance for his own political benefit.

Foreign countries now owe the United States nearly twelve bil-
lions of dollars. Of this amount Great Britain owes \$4,746,862,560.
France owes nearly \$4,000,000,000, Italy nearly two billion, Belgium
nearly half a billion, Finland nine million, Greece over 15 million, Po-
land over 150 million, Russia over 200 million.

Of all these countries, Great Britain alone has even suggested
payment. Great Britain alone has adopted a business like program
to balance her budget. Great Britain alone has reduced her army, cur-
tailed expenditures on her navy, and imposed a tax on her own
people commensurate with her obligations,—the heaviest individual
tax of any world power.

When Great Britain has done this, and also agreed to America's
terms, when she single handed has taken the lead in Europe to re-
turn the world to something like financial normalcy, the least an
American statesman could do would be either to accept the offer with
American statesman could do, would be to accept the offer with
thanks.

But La Follette, scornful of the role of statesman, proceeds to adopt
the role of politician and stirs up the animals with an anti-British
harangue, that is not only unnecessary and dangerous at this time,
but is absolutely false in all its implications.

We agree with "Hell Maria" Daves. The greatest danger to
this country today, lies in the demagogue in congress.

friends here.

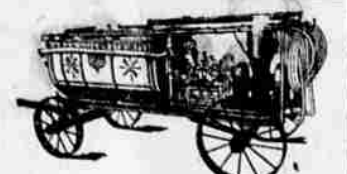
Mrs. Joe Millard of Medford, nee

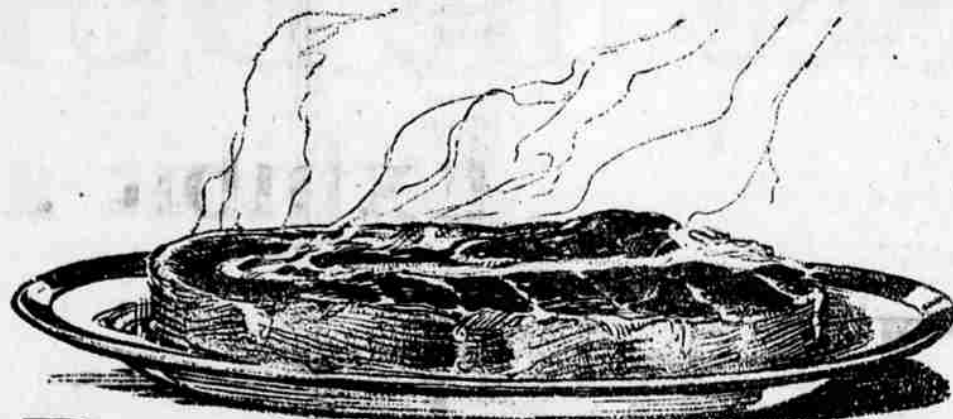
