ALLOW NO MORE CARS WITH 1922 LICENSES IN JACKSON COUNTY

Motorists take warning! The lid is on and henceforth will be tightened. Deputy state motor vehicle inspector J. J. McMahon issued a warning this morning to Medford and valley motorists and announced that from now on a man applying for a license for his car must go to the sheriff with the application and the money and get temporary license plates.

"No more cars will be allowed on the streets and highways with 1922 license plates," said McMahon. "Everyone without 1923 license plates must have temporary license plates or must let his car stand until the 1923 plates arrive."

The office of the secretary of state has sent a communication to officials stating that orders for license plates have been filled on the same day when they have been received ever since February 1st.

A further warning was issued by McMahon who said, "Every driver must have his operator's card upon his person while driving his car. The law states that the driver must have and carry the card. Also, no tractors will be allowed to run on the highway as long as they have cleat tread. Before running a tractor on the highway the cleats must be removed."
