WILL RUSSIA BE THE ULTIMATE VICTOR?

THREE items of news apparently little noticed may have an im-
portant bearing upon the fate of Europe.

One item was to the effect that the latest German strikes in the
Ruhr were not sanctioned by the government, but were called by the
labor leaders.

Another announced a strike of 100,000 miners in France.
The third was a strike of 50,000 laborers in Belgium.

Of course, from this distance, it is impossible to accurately gauge
the situation, but there is good reason to believe:

First, that the occupation of the Ruhr has not solidified Germany
but has given the German radicals and monarchists an opportunity
of which they are taking advantage, to bring about an overthrow of
the republic.

Second, that this occupation has not been supported by organized
labor in either France or Belgium, and that there is a movement in
both countries to drive a wedge between the respective governments
and the people, and prepare the way for a dictatorship of the prole-
tariat.

And thirdly, that the Russian soviet government, apparently
taking no action regarding the Ruhr occupation, has through paid
agents, been working from the first to prepare the field in middle
Europe for the final establishment of bolshevism.

In short, unless Germany and France soon come to some agree-
ment and the general progress toward open conflict continues the
most probable outcome, after a period of destruction and bloodshed,
seems to be the spread of Bolshevism to the channel ports, and Rus-
sian hegemony in Europe from Moscow to Ostend.

Today's News in
U. S. Congress

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Brigadier
General Frank T. Hines, resigned,
who was chief of transportation for
the army during the world war, has
been added to the growing list of pos-
sible appointees to the veterans' bu-
reau directorship. Selection of Gen-
eral Hines was urged by Senator
Calder, republican, New York, during
a conference today with President
Harding.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Eight
members of the house agriculture
committee would be authorized to
tour the country at their own expense
to study reforestation questions under
a resolution reported today from the
committee.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—House
action on the senate amendments to
the bill giving approval of the British
settlement agreement was deferred
today until tomorrow.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Another
attack on Henry Ford's offer for the
Muskegon Shoa power project was
made in the senate today by Chairman
Norris of the senate agricultural com-
mittee who read a letter he wrote re-
cently to Nebraska constituents, de-
claring acceptance of the Ford offer
would constitute "a gift of the Ameri-
can taxpayers' money so elaborate
and so great as to make every legisla-
tive job of a similar character since
the dawn of civilization fade into in-
significance."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—One piece
of farm credits legislation was passed
today by the house. It was the Strong
bill, increasing the maximum of land
bank loans to farmers from \$10,000 to
\$15,000 with provision for loans up to
\$25,000 in exceptional cases, subject
to the approval of the farm loan
board.

KPO will broadcast tonight from 8 to
9:30 o'clock on 400 meter wave length

program, both of jazz and serious
