

ASHLAND CITIZEN TO BUILD A BIG APARTMENT HOUSE

ASHLAND, Feb. 21.—While a big hotel project is dragging its way along on blue sky and paper, Emil Peil is actually planning a colossal apartment house, and report is to the effect that work on same will be under way soon. Peil owns a lot of property fronting on both Granite and Park streets, and it is his plan to use this vacant space, waiting no longer for hotel projects to assume definite shape. Dimensions of these lots measure about 200 feet frontage on Granite street, with a depth of 100 feet to Park street, the latter thoroughfare being one of the main stems leading from the Plaza as a leading center to the park domain, right in direct line with the community clubhouse, Pioneer cabin, and other public and semi-public gathering places. The site would also command a fine view in various directions, including both residential and business centers, scenic views, etc.

During the recent snow spell, regulation snowshovels were in far greater demand than the supply. At last one was discovered in the crypt of a local hardware store on the Plaza. In style of construction, and general appearance it bore a close resemblance to some of the other majolica lately rescued from the tomb of old Tutankhamen. GERMANY IS NOW LOOKING FOR A CHANCE TO PARLEY

BERLIN, Feb. 20.—(By the Associated Press)—Former Chancellor Wirth has told a meeting of the centre party members at Ulm that the resistance in the Ruhr is aimed at bringing about negotiations, the Vossische Zeitung says. The government, he added, must be watchful, so as not to miss the moment when negotiations will be possible.

DUESSELDORF, Feb. 20.—(By the Associated Press)—The workmen on the Duren-Grevenbroich section of the railway taken over from the British occupation authorities by the French, have gone on strike rather than continue their services under the supervision of the French military.

BERLIN, Feb. 20.—(By the Associated Press)—The German government has sent a note to the French, British and Belgian governments and the Rhineland "commission" at Coblenz vigorously protesting against the expulsion of German officials from the occupied territories. The note also protests against what is described the "brutal manner in which the expulsions have been carried out."

LONDON, Feb. 20.—(By the Associated Press)—Dispatches from the Ruhr printed here today assert that the German cabinet ministers continue to visit the occupied region in defiance of the recent order prohibiting their presence. It is asserted that Herr Severing, minister of the interior and Herr Groener, minister of transportation were recent visitors. The Times learns that the Belgians have occupied the railway stations at Hogenhausen and Herbest.

PORTLAND CLUB HELD A NUISANCE TOO MUCH HOOCH

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 21.—Landlords of premises upon which liquor is sold in violation of the Volstead law were held Monday to be responsible for the use made of their property, according to a decision handed down by Federal Judge Charles E. Wolverton in which the Pastime club at No. 69 North Third street is declared a nuisance and ordered closed for one year.

This precedent in the enforcement of the prohibition law in Oregon was set when Judge Wolverton, on the motion of Assistant United States Attorney Edward D. Baldwin, issued a permanent injunction against the club.

The decree also permanently enjoins Louis Zarkovich and Tony Protoka, proprietors of the club, from dealing in liquor in Oregon during the remainder of their lives. The last order means that if these men are arrested again for dealing in liquor, they can not only be penalized for violating the Volstead act, but also for contempt of court. For the contempt offense they would be denied the right of trial by jury, being absolutely at the mercy of the court. There would be no appeal to a higher court from any penalty the judge might impose.
