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POWDER FACTORY BLOWS UP, FEAR BIG LOSS OF LIFE

GRAFTON, Ill., Feb. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—One man is known to have been killed and one injured in a series of several explosions at the plant of the Illinois Powder Manufacturing company near here this afternoon. The number of dead and injured may increase when the debris is cleared away.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 22.—It was said over the long distance telephone from Grafton, Ill., that three explosions occurred this afternoon at the plant of the Illinois Powder company. The explosion was felt in some parts of St. Louis, which is 26 miles from Grafton.

The telephone reports from Grafton stated the fire in the smaller buildings was advancing toward a store containing 100 tons of glycerine and that it was feared this would explode. The plant consists of about forty buildings, mostly small, scattered over a tract of 135 acres, it was said.

AMERICAN DOG DERBY STARTS AT ASHTON, IDAHO

ASHTON, Idaho, Feb. 22.—Ten drivers have drawn places for the annual American dog derby which will be run here today. They are:

"Tud" Kent of Buffalo River, the present champion; Lydia Hutchison, Ashton; William Koech, Big Springs; George Pilcher, Henry's Lake; William Trude, Island Park; Gilbert Berry, Squirrel; Olcott Zern, Ashton; John Reber, Shotgun Valley and Clara Colwell, Green Timber.

The Colwell team is owned by Miss Colwell, who may decide to start it herself. If she does, it will mean that two women will race in today's derby.

While the famous classic is confined to ten teams, there are a hundred more in Ashton which have brought their owners in over the trails for the event. While comparatively little known, the dog teams are used in this region during winter fully as much as in far northern territory.

Tud Kent, twice American champion, is the favorite to capture the race.

"Lydia" Hutchison, the only girl entry in the race, is entering her own team. Last year she won "Smoky" Gaston's number and drove a sensational race over the 25 mile trail.

U. S. WAR DEBT IS OVER 24 BILLION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—The war and after-the-war tax bill of the American people has aggregated \$24,261,158,536, or more than the present total of the public debt. This is disclosed in the report today of the house appropriations committee on the third deficiency appropriation bill, which carries an item of \$78,656,000 for the refund of taxes erroneously collected.

Of the total \$1,606,905,343 represents additional assessments and collections resulting from office audits and field investigation.

FIND \$28,000 IN BOGUS U. S. MONEY

VANCOUVER, B. C., Feb. 22.—About \$28,000 in bogus United States currency has been reported in this district recently, according to the police. This sum is said to have consisted of 1400 \$20 bills, purporting to be an issue known as the "Grover Cleveland," payable at a bank in San Francisco.

Investigators say that much of this bogus money was put into circulation here through illicit liquor operations.

IRISH CONFLICT KEPT ALIVE BY SOVIET AGENTS

LONDON, Feb. 22.—(By Associated Press.)—A change from a non-committal view of the pacification of Ireland to "a cautious but undoubted optimism," among well informed residents of Dublin is reported by the correspondent of the Daily Mail who has just returned from the Irish city after an absence of five months.

The correspondent says that no one in Dublin actually declares that peace is in sight, but that nearly everyone is convinced that the disintegration of the republicans has set in and that a fresh outbreak of violence and destruction will increase this undermining the republican strength.

The increasing destruction of country houses has been caused by communists, according to the writer.

"The Irish government," he asserts, "holds evidence that in return for arms and money suggestions were made that the influence of republican Irish organizations in the United States would be secured to obtain recognition of the soviet by the United States."

POLICE WILL GUARD ANTI-FRENCH MEET

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—Four hundred patrolmen, a troop of mounted police and a large detail of detectives today were ordered by Chief Inspector Lahey to preserve order tonight at a Madison Square Garden meeting called in protest against the invasion of the Ruhr by French troops.

Senator Borah of Idaho, was announced as the principal speaker at the meeting which was called by a special non-partisan committee of which Senator-elect Edwards of New Jersey is chairman. Resolutions will be offered declaring the French policy "threatens the peace and prosperity of the world."

TWO CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS OFFERED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Two proposed amendments to the constitution were ordered reported today to the house.

One, by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, would change from March to January the date of inaugurating presidents and from December to January the time for the convening of the regular session of congress.

The other, by Representative Foster, republican, Ohio, would give congress power concurrent with that of the several states to limit and to prohibit the labor of persons under the age of 18. A similar amendment has been reported by a senate committee.

DAYTON HELICOPTER SETS A NEW RECORD

DAYTON, Ohio, Feb. 21.—A new record was set by the DeBothebaat helicopter, being perfected by the air service at McCook field here, when it remained in the air for two minutes and 45 seconds in flight early today.

The machine, which arises and descends vertically, reached a height of fifteen feet. Previous marks set by the machine in flights last December 18, were a height of eight feet and a flight duration of one minute and 49 seconds.

Chicago Banker Gets Two Years
CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—Federal Judge Aischuler today sentenced John W. Worthington, known as the "wolf of La Salle street," to Leavenworth federal prison for two years and to pay a fine of \$1000 upon conviction of using the mails to defraud.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—After the reading of the farewell address had been concluded, Senator Gooding, republican, Idaho, spoke an hour and ten minutes on his wheat price stabilization bill.

Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee, who then took the floor, opened his speech with the declaration that he did not expect to "find time today" to complete the discussion he hoped to make. He added, however, that he intended "to go thoroughly" into each of a half dozen subjects. When he began he was the only member on the democratic side of the chamber and Senator Jones, in charge of the bill, was all alone on the opposite side.

BELFAST, Feb. 22.—(By Associated Press.) General O'Daly, commanding the free state forces in county Kerry, reports the surrender of the irregular leader Pierce and his column of 17 men, to facilitate which the amnesty in northern Kerry was extended 48 hours.

After signing an undertaking providing for their good behavior, the irregulars were allowed to go.

CHINA DISCOVERS VALUE OF MILK DRINKING HABIT

WASHINGTON, Feb.—A hundred years or more ago the empress of China, by imperial edict, declared it selfish for human beings to drink cow's milk. The august old lady thought it deprived calves of their natural food. Thus without knowing it, perhaps, she created a dietary regime for Chinese children from which they are only now about to be released.

About a decade ago the Chinese began to take notice of the use of milk by missionaries, and in the vicinity of the mission stations, began using their own cows and water buffalo as food sources. Once started on a milk diet, the trend has been growing by leaps and bounds. Importations of condensed milk, milk powders and the sale of ice cream in the foreign colonies of the large cities have turned the attention of the Chinese to milk drinking habits and they have now begun to study the benefits that might come to their children if the old empress had not issued her edict.

America with its billions of dollars invested in dairy cattle and products and machinery factories, is looking to China as a big outlet, and its hopes are about to be realized, according to the world's dairy congress association. A type of letter being received from the far east by the association has just arrived from Ellwood Varney, an American milk expert of the Liberty Dairy at Shanghai.

"There is no better opportunity in the world than right here in China," writes Mr. Varney in a plea for aid in getting American dairy school men to the Orient. "The kind of men wanted are the sort who are as much interested in the future of dairying as they are in fattening their own pocketbooks. We do not want the self-seeker. We want the doer and the giver and he will find himself richly rewarded."

HONOLULU, Feb. 22.—(By Associated Press.) Charles T. Dailey, commissioner of public lands, announced today that Joseph G. Andrews, sub-agent at Hilo had written him confessing a shortage of \$26,300 in the Hilo office accounts. Dailey said Andrews' letter declared he would plead guilty to the charge of responsibility for the loss.

Andrews' resignation recently was requested but Dailey said that at that time he had no suspicion the Hilo accounts were short.
