## GEORGE WASHINGTON AND COMMON SENSE.

WASHINGTON could not tell a lie. So he didn't say he had  
jumped across the Rappahannock river. Nor did he say his  
country should beware of "entangling alliances."

Thomas Jefferson said that, and some romantic Boswell pulled  
that broad-jumping fairy tale.

George Washington was an honest man. He was also a very prac-  
tical man. If one were to pick out his most striking characteristic  
it was his uncompromising common sense.

Therefore, if he were here today, it is fair to assume that he would  
be among those who favor a more vigorous foreign policy, not pri-  
marily to help Europe but to help ourselves. He would see that until  
there is some sanity and order in Europe, there can be no permanent  
stability and prosperity at home.

In his farewell address he did urge his country to keep out of  
European conflicts. Such advice was entirely sound. But he made  
an objection when Benjamin Franklin went to France to make an  
entangling alliance. He made no protest against a treaty with Hol-  
land in 1782. For such entanglements helped his country.

In 1799 Washington said: "My own wish is to see everything set-  
tled upon the best and surest foundation for the peace and happiness  
of mankind, without regard to this, that or the other nation."

Such a statement applied to present day conditions means, we  
believe, that Washington would have been active in promoting some  
sort of world accord, looking to a refunding of the world's moral  
debt. He would not favor applying his policies of the eighteenth cen-  
tury to those of the twentieth. He would not duplicate his program  
for one of the weakest nations of the world for one of the strongest.  
He had too much common sense.

CALIF. RANCHER  
CLAIMS ALKALI  
LAND PRODUCTIVE

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—C. R. Jones,  
a farmer of California and the first  
witness for the defense in the trial  
of ten officials of the Daniel Hays  
company, charged with conspiracy to  
use the mails to defraud, testified in  
federal court today that the land pro-  
moted by the company in Merced  
county, largely covered with alkali,  
could be made productive by irrigation.

Upon this land which prosecution  
witnesses declared was virtually  
worthless and on which government  
officials say the company realized  
more than \$4,000,000 almost any-  
thing can be grown after proper ir-  
rigation, Jones testified.

On the 34 acres he owned, he said,  
all the alkali has been drained off by  
water. He testified that he had ten  
acres in alfalfa with six or seven  
crops a year; ten acres covered with  
a vineyard from which he gathered  
ten tons of grapes last year and four-  
teen acres in orchard producing fruit  
better than the ordinary.

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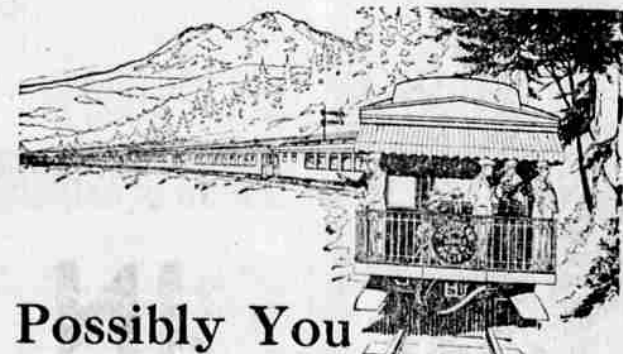
