

SON-IN-LAW OF BANK PRESIDENT SKIPS WITH CASH

WARREN, Mass., Feb. 22.—With Frank L. Taylor, president of the First National bank of Warren, under arrest in Chicago, local authorities today turned their attention to a search for Joseph B. Marcano, alleged to be the brains behind the disappearance of \$213,000 in bonds and securities from the bank's vaults.

Marcano, reported to have been missing since February 12, was believed to be on his way to South America, officials said.

His true name was said to be Joseph B. Blata, who, it was declared, was being sought for similar bank lootings in two California cities and of the Mechanics and Merchants' bank of Philadelphia.

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—Frank L. Taylor, president of the First National bank of Warren, Mass., closed by bank examiners investigating the reported disappearance of \$213,000 in securities, today was under arrest here and detectives awaited the arrival of his wife to apprehend her.

A search was being instituted for Abraham Goldman of Chicago, owner of the controlling interest in the institution and Joseph B. Marcano, who, it was said, had purchased a controlling interest in the Merchants and Mechanics' bank at Philadelphia and the Niagara Life Insurance company of Buffalo, N. Y.

Arrested by private detectives here last night, Taylor said the first news of his bank's failure reached him through newspapers. A suspicion that all was not well at the institution, Taylor told the officers, brought him to Chicago to confer with Goldman. Marcano, Taylor's son-in-law, had disappeared a week ago with the key to a safety deposit box containing the bank's stocks and bonds.

Taylor said in his conference with Goldman the latter voiced a suspicion that Marcano had fled with the bank's funds. Extradition was waived by Taylor and he expressed a willingness to return to Warren at once.

SEES 28 HR. MAIL THRU AIR FROM COAST TO CHICAGO

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 22.—Before many years have passed every important business center of the nation will be connected by air mail routes and transmission of mails between the centers will be by means of airplanes flying at night over lighted airways, Colonel Paul Henderson, second assistant postmaster general told Alabama postmasters recently.

Transmission of mails by airplane is a success, Henderson declared. An efficiency of 94.39 per cent was maintained during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, he stated. From July 16, 1921, until September 7, 1922 postal fliers traversed 2,000,000 miles without a fatal accident.

Experiments and study have demonstrated, Colonel Henderson said, that night flying is safe and practical.

"Our experiments and study have reached the stage where it is, I think, safe to conclude that it is entirely possible at night," he said. "We are now engaged in the task of locating emergency landing fields every 25 miles between Chicago and Cheyenne. Each of these fields will be lighted with lights thought necessary to make them proper for night navigation. Between each field will be a line of smaller lights, solely to keep the aviator properly on his route."

"If we are successful in this, it will mean that we will be able to make trans-continental flights from New York to Chicago in the daytime, Chicago to Cheyenne at night, and from Cheyenne to San Francisco in the early part of the second day. We should be able to establish and maintain a schedule of from 24 to 30 hours between New York and San Francisco if this night flying experiment proves out. The entire aviation fraternity is watching this experiment of ours between Chicago and Cheyenne hopeful of a successful accomplishment."

W. R. HEARST FILM CO. JOINS WITH GOLDWYN

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—The International Film company of which William Randolph Hearst is head, and which controls the Cosmopolitan productions, had merged with the Goldwyn corporation, it was disclosed today. The merger, however, affects only the distribution of pictures and each company will continue to produce films as a separate organization. There will be no changes in the executive branches of the two companies.

The Hearst pictures have for several years been distributed by the Famous Players-Lasky corporation, which now is facing prosecution by the federal trade commission, charged with unfair competition and monopolistic policies.

ALBANY LEGISLATURE FOR WINE AND BEER

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 22.—The senate concurred today with the assembly in adopting a resolution to memorialize congress to legalize wine and beer by modification of the Volstead act.

An amendment was approved by both houses providing that the governor sign the resolution and transmit copies to all members of congress.

BOTH SIDES SURE OF VICTORY IN OHIO KLAN CASE

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, Feb. 22.—Confidence as to the outcome was expressed today by counsel for both defense and state as the preliminary hearing of the case of W. M. Cortner, kleagle and organizer of the local Ku Klux Klan, charged with riotous conspiracy, entered on its second day in court here.

Several witnesses have been subpoenaed for the state. It was announced today. Among them are George E. McCord, superintendent of the public schools, and Arthur B. Bland, an official of the Indiana, Columbus and Eastern Traction company.

First intimation that the state would endeavor to bring the Fulton school case into the proceedings was received with the appearance in court of Mont C. Hambright, clerk of the common pleas court with the papers in the case.

The Fulton school case involves the efforts of the board of education to establish an all-negro school in the Fulton district. Officials of the civil rights protective league (negro) sued the board, asking for an injunction to restrain the transfer of pupils in or out of the district on the basis of race or color. The court granted the injunction. During the pendency of the case, the negro residents established pickets around the school and considerable feeling was aroused.

FREIGHTER TOWED IN BY PACIFIC LINER

TOKIO, Feb. 22.—(By Associated Press.) The Pacific Mail liner President Lincoln, from San Francisco for Yokohama, made port today with the disabled United States shipping board freighter Heffron in tow, winning a stiff battle of skillful seamanship against mountainous seas and slashing gales.

The passenger liner for four days struggled ahead in the storm with the Heffron, crippled by a broken propeller, dragging at the end of the line. On Sunday the bawser parted but the liner again picked up her charge, although with great difficulty and today the two made port undamaged except for the Heffron's broken blades.

The freighter's officers gave the highest praise to the seamanship of the liner's officers.

UNEMPLOYMENT IN UNITED STATES SHOWS DECREASE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Employment throughout the country during January increased 1.4 per cent over the preceding month, according to a report made public today by the bureau of labor statistics while a decrease of 2.8 per cent was registered in the total amount of wages paid.

The figures are based on reports from 4,153 establishments in 43 industries.

Increases in the number of employees for January as compared with December were shown in 24 industries and decreases in 18, while employment in one industry remained stationary.

Increases in the total amount of payrolls for January as compared with December were shown in only 12 industries, and decreases in 31.

Increases in employment for the year 1922 were shown in 10 industries and decreases in three. Automobiles, iron and steel, car building and repairing, showed increases of 42.7, 4.2 and 25.8 per cent respectively, while means clothing showed a decrease of 9.3 per cent.

Of the 43 industries reporting for January, 81 per cent was operating on full time, 17 per cent on part time and two per cent were closed down.

Wage adjustments effective between December 15 and January 15 showed increases in various establishments of forty industries that reported, with the exception of three instances, where decreases were reported.

Mrs. M. E. Middlebush and son Denzil have returned from the Applegate where they have been visiting the former's daughter, Mrs. M. Pence and family.

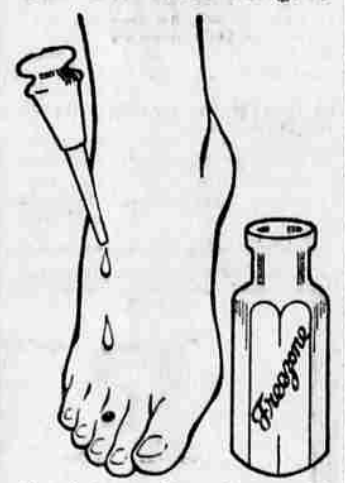
S. W. Hutchison has been hauling lumber from the Elk Creek sawmill to build a small house for the renter on his ranch.

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5,322,708 BARRELS OF APPLES STILL IN COLD STORAGE

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—While apple trees are putting forth blossoms for this season's apple crop, persons who follow the old adage will have no trouble obtaining their fruit, according to a report made public today by the United States bureau of agricultural economics.

This month's report of apples in cold storage, exclusive of those in wholesale houses and retail stores, showed that there are 5,322,708 barrels of apples yet to be removed, an average of about five pounds of apples for every inhabitant of the country.

As early as October 1 last year, 1,452,000 barrels of apples went into storage, an unusually large amount, due to a car shortage in nearly all producing areas, fairly heavy production and low prices early in the season. The peak was reached in December when about 6,743,000 barrels, one million more than in 1921, were held.

But the holiday season made an impression on the immense storage and thereafter the stock began to diminish and will eventually be wiped out by April or May. A large proportion of stored apples require no further transportation by rail as they are held in the cities.

New York Baldwin apples were vigorously quoted at the leading markets this week from \$4.50 to \$5.50 a barrel. Little advance was noted because of the large storage.

Effects of the cold wave of last week and the week before were seen in the shipments of potatoes received last week. Only 2400 cars were marketed, a decrease of \$90 compared with the previous seven days. As a result prices held firm in all markets.
