"Certainly ninety-five per cent of
our social evils, and I hate to say
how many of our political troubles,
would immediately disappear if peo-
ple really believed the religion they
profess," said Roger W. Babson in
one of his bankers reports recently.

The same report contained this
statement: "Physicians are agreed that
a very large per centage of our
bodily ailments would be avoided if
we were at peace spiritually."

"It all sounds like 'Sky Pilot'
stuff," said Rev. Sannett today in
commenting on these statements.
"But those words represent the sober
judgment of one of America's best
business men." If any banker in the
country wants to know how business
conditions will be a month or a year
from now, he asks Roger W. Babson.
And Babson usually tells him. And
strange to say, Mr. Babson always
feels the pulse of the soul of the na-
tion in making up his statistical re-
ports. In the light of these things
it would seem that a sanely con-
ducted series of meetings to quicken

the spiritual life of a community is a
mighty practical endeavor.

"Our church," the pastor contin-
ued earnestly, "has engaged the ser-
vices of a man who is considered by
many as the greatest evangelist in
America. He is Rev. Will H. Huff of
Sioux City. I have known him for
twelve years and can sincerely say
that I have never heard his equal as
a gospel preacher. His emphasis is
on the personal life, and the soul's re-
lationship to God."

Mr. Sannett said he desired it em-
phasized that the services will be
open to every one. "I shall be great-
ly disappointed if this series of meet-
ings does not bring a blessing to
every church in town," he said.

"In conclusion," the minister ad-
ded, "you can say that Dr. Huff will
arrive in time for the opening ser-
vice Sunday morning. He will
preach at both services on Sunday's
and each evening for two weeks. Our
church will not hold the crowds after
the first few days, but we will open
the League room and accommodate
as many as we possibly can."
