be applied to reconstruction of public works destroyed in the fire of last December.

A bill to prevent teachers of public schools appearing in class room in religious garb was enacted. As originally passed by the house, this bill provided penalties for teachers violating it but this was amended by the senate to omit the penalties for the teachers and in this form it finally passed both houses.

Bounty Bill Passed.

The senate late yesterday reconsidered and passed a bill which it had killed earlier in the day establishing a hunter system for destroying predatory animals. It provides a county option method of operation.

The house finally killed a bill to permit payment of three-fourths of the annual license fees in cases where automobiles cannot be used during the winter months.

A special election November 6, 1923 on any matters referred to the people is provided for in a bill finally passed last night.

spices the indisposition of the politicians to condemn these minority organizations for their acts of lawlessness. When he sees a political office holder tremble before an organized minority and fail to enforce the law—when he sees the politician in his platform even evade the issue—the American citizen knows that his liberties are in danger and that when his liberties are gone his form of government falls with them. The patriotic American citizen has come to realize that a secret or open organization, whatever may be the outward profession of its purpose—whether the perpetration or abolition of wrong—if it makes use of unlawful methods, is an enemy of him and of his government.

Society Disintegrates.

Whenever law is unenforced, the inexorable mandates of human nature assert themselves and automatically a disintegration of society sets in which, unless checked, finally develops into internal warfare. When, under a weak enforcement of law, this process starts, it must proceed to an ultimate disintegration involving acute human misery if the average of character and condition of the population is not such that a general consciousness of the situation produces a reaction strong enough to again re-establish a firm and just execution of law.
