BEST LEGISLATURE FOR YEARS SAYS RALPH COWGILL

"I'm glad it is all over, for the session grew to be an awful tough grind," said Ralph Cowgill, one of the two Jackson county representatives in the legislature which closed early Friday. Senator George Dunn of Ashland, and Representative John H. Carlin of Medford are en route home from Salem by auto and are expected to reach the city this afternoon or tonight.

"It was the best legislature for years, I was told on every side," Mr. Cowgill said. "There was little log rolling and not so much bitterness as in past legislatures. On the whole much good was accomplished for the state, both in bills passed and ones defeated."

"The Jackson county delegation was prominent all through the session and fared well in the legislation it sought. John Carlin was to the forefront on bills of importance, worked like a beaver all the time, and led in the last fight to put some of the big legislation through, notably the consolidation of state departments, which never had a chance of passage. John thrives on work."

"Personally all the bills I sponsored were passed except one, and that one was the proposed measure for additional traffic enforcement, where I ran counter to the wishes of Governor Pierce."

In vetoing this house bill by Cowgill, providing for the employment of additional state traffic enforcement, the governor took occasion to rebuke the legislature for ignoring his request for legislation which would have unified the policing of the state highways under the supervision of the state highway commission.

FORM AMERICAN LAW INSTITUTE TO AID JUSTICE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—A re-statement of American law to remedy its chief defects of "uncertainty and complexity" and thus secure better administration of justice, is the task to be undertaken by the newly-created American law institute.

Formally organized yesterday at a conference here of jurists and lawyers, the purpose of the institute are to "promote the clarification and simplification of the law for administration of justice and to carry on scientific legal work."

Perfection of the organization as the first step was entrusted to a council of 21 members. That work accomplished, the institute will proceed to the task of re-stating and codifying the law. With the exception of the justices of the United States supreme court, all who attended the conference, including the chief justices of many of the state supreme courts, were made charter members and incorporators of the institute.

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OREGON SENATORS JOIN IN KILLING SHIP SUBSIDY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—The administration shipping bill again was brought before the senate today, preparatory to the dealing of a death blow to it on Monday.

The senate, by a vote of 46 to 38, decided to take up the measure, which had been laid aside during the week for conference reports, but immediately before it could be put before the senate its opponents, through Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the acting democratic leader, moved to kill it through recommitment.

This motion, under a unanimous consent agreement proposed by Senator Curtis of Kansas, the assistant republican leader, will remain pending for a vote on Monday with all factions in the bitter fight conceding that it will carry.

On the motion to take up the bill three democrats, Senators Broussard and Ranswell, Louisiana, and Pomerene, Ohio, voted with 43 republicans in favor of bringing the measure before the senate. Nine republicans voted against taking up the bill. They were Senators Borah, Idaho; Brookhart, Iowa; Capper, Kansas; Couzens, Michigan; Ladd, North Dakota; La Follette, Wisconsin; McNary, Oregon; Norris, Nebraska and Stanford, Oregon.
