

FRANK S. REGAN TO SPEAK TONIGHT AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Honorable Frank S. Regan, of Rockford, Illinois, former member of the Illinois legislature, a member of the first division of the flying squadron, is a unique orator.

Mr. Regan is a tax expert, a cartoonist, a rapid crayon worker, who with lightning speed draws pictures to illustrate his points. Though the subject of taxes is supposed to be as dry as dust, it is said he keeps his audiences keyed up every minute of the time and has them applauding throughout his addresses.

No admission is charged for his lectures or for the addresses of any of the other speakers who make up the combination. Everybody is invited.

The squadron will hold a series of six big meetings in Medford on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, February 24, 25 and 26th, in the First Christian church. The meetings will be held at 2:30 and 7:30 p. m. daily.

Mr. Regan speaks Saturday afternoon and evening.

The Rev. Fred W. Corbett, member of the first division of the Flying Squadron, is said to be, in a very real sense, a self-made man.

Despite the fact that, while still very young, he lost his father and was obliged to share responsibility for the care of the children of the family younger than himself, he was determined to secure an education and accordingly pushed his way through high school and college overcoming obstacles which to a less determined youth, would have been insurmountable.

Soon after entering the ministry, he became greatly interested in the cause of prohibition and decided to devote all of his time and talent to it. In this work he has been signally honored.

Mr. Corbett has traveled and spoken in almost every state of the union. He is said to be a logical thinker, true to the cause he advocates and gifted in the art of pleasing his listeners whether they agree with him or not. His arguments are indisputable; his addresses pungent, clear, forceful and eloquent.

He will also speak in Medford today, in the First Christian church, at 7:30 p. m. No admission charge will be made. All meetings are free.

REV. F. R. LEACH TO ATTEND BAPTIST CONF., PORTLAND

A state conference of all Baptist ministers will be held next Tuesday and Wednesday in Portland at the White Temple at which time the scriptural teaching of the entire subject of Divine Healing will be presented and discussed.

The theme for treatment will be "Did your Lord intend the healing ministry of the days of His flesh to be a part of His Universal Ministry? Or were the gifts purely Temporary?" POULTRY RAISING ON INCREASE IN AGATE DISTRICT

AGATE, Feb. 23.—Within the last two years the farmers of this community have added considerably to their poultry holdings.
